Management recieves Centre keys

On 27 June, World Archery Excellence Centre staff officially received the building's keys, which is expected to begin operations in September.

Management inspected and reviewed each area and space with the construction team, the architects and the engineers. While most of the areas were immediately approved during the meeting, there were some details the parties agreed to continue to work on during July.

"The quality of the construction is excellent," said Centre Director Juan Carlos Holgado. "There are some details that we have identified that can be improved, but the

building as a whole has been delivered to an exceptional standard of finish and on time."

Any aspects left to finish will be completed before the Centre opens for its soft launch.

Fixtures and furniture: installed

With the official handover of the Centre building, the first set of furniture for offices and meeting rooms was received on 1 July.

The fittings, which includes office desks, chairs, meeting room tables and cupboard, were donated by the International Olympic Committee, one of the World Archery Excellence Centre's biggest contributors, from its former headquarters in Vidy, Lausanne, which is currently being demolished to make room for a new construction.

FIDTA and the World Archery Excellence Centre would like to thank the IOC for its continued support of the project and the donation that marks the beginning of a new era in the Olympic sport of archery.

A second set of fittings for the cafeteria, lounges, meeting rooms, reception and patios has been ordered to WSA, a Swiss company specialising in the office industry.

WSA studied the needs of the Centre and proposed modern solutions, produced by brand Steelcase, for the use of the spaces.

The fixtures are expected to arrive on site by the middle of August.





Centre to welcome region's Unihockey teams

The Centre has signed a contract to become the new training facility of two Unihockey clubs from the Lausanne region.

Unihockey, also known as floorball, is played indoors with five field players and a goalkeeper on each team. Developed in the 1960s in Sweden, it is a popular sport in Switzerland.

The LUC and Mouvement Junior Belmont-Epalinges-Savigny clubs' junior teams will train twice a week, from 6 to 10pm, occupying two-thirds of the indoor hall. Archery will still be practised at the same time, as the Centre has movable separations to divide environments.

The partnership fits with the Centre's initiative to be a multi-sport venue offering activities to the communities of Lausanne and the Canton of Vaud.

"We are excited to welcome this young and new sporting community into our Centre, as we are sure there will be a positive synergy between our sport and theirs," said Centre Director Juan Carlos Holgado.

Unihockey will use the Centre from the end of August.

OUTDOOR FIELD

FINISHED IN OCTOBER

The landscaping of the outdoor archery field, which is being done by the company Vorlet SA, is beginning to take shape.

At the start of July, the 90-metre long range was being treated before turf is installed.

The field is expected to be completed by the end of August, though it needs time to mature, and except for the trees and bushes that should be ready in October.

All the vegetation being planted on the Centre's grounds are Swiss in origin and part of the Centre's eco-friendly principle of respect to the forest reservation that surrounds the land.

While the outdoor field is finished, users of the Centre will be able to use the indoor facilities, including shooting hall and gym.
