The meeting commenced at 9:30 am on Thursday and finished 4:20 pm on Friday.

1. Opening of Congress and approval of the Agenda

World Archery President, Prof Dr Ugur Erdener opened the 55th World Archery Congress in Berlin, Germany at 9:30 am on Thursday, 27 July 2023.

The President of the German Shooting and Archery Federation, Mr Hans-Heinrich von Schönfels gave a welcoming speech. He expressed his pleasure to welcome all the delegates in Berlin and highlighted that Germany is hosting World Archery Congress for the fourth time - previously in Munich 1972, in Berlin 1979 and in Leipzig 2007. Despite the changes in the world in the past half century, the passion for sport has remained the same. He thanked World Archery for the trust to host both Congress and the World Championships that also act as an Olympic Qualifier.

- CUW, MTN joined the Congress as temporary member and voting right was given after the affiliation as full member in agenda item 6.
- MEX as the federation is derecognised and there is a transitional committee in place, the
 representative were allowed to attend Congress without voting rights and it will count as
 an official Congress attendance.
- UZB and proxy from TJK UZB did not have the voting right at the beginning of the Congress. The registered delegate did not attend and the representative who was present, did not have a valid delegate confirmation letter at the start of the Congress. The voting right was assigned after an official letter was received.

Voting Delegates received a voting tablet at registration. Tablets were used for voting. There were no paper handouts during the Congress.



The quorum was achieved, as 65 full members with voting right were present with 189 votes and 27 represented by a proxy (one vote per proxy) during the roll call. Total of 206 votes at the beginning of the Congress.

4. The President's opening remarks

The President opened the session and welcomed all delegates.

5. Nominations of scrutineers

Congress appointed Ms Barbara Manning (RSA) and Mr Rifaat Chabouk (ESP) as scrutineers. Neither of the scrutineers had candidates up for election from their countries.

Voting procedure

All votes were cast by electronic voting unless mentioned otherwise. A test was made to see if the voting system worked in the beginning of each session and Congress Delegates did not object to the use of the system, which conforms to the World Archery Constitution.

6. Minutes of the Congress 2021 in Yankton, USA

One correction was made – reference to Andreas Lorenz as former member or the Target Archery Committee and not as the chairperson.

The minutes were approved unanimously by the raise of the hands.

7. Matters arising from the minutes

Financial programme – in the minutes it was reported that a postal vote would take place on the programme. However, the process of renegotiating the mortgage with the bank for the World Archery Excellence Centre took longer than planned. When the document was finalised, it was close to the deadline for publishing the documents for this Congress. Therefore, it is included in the agenda of this Congress.

8. Reports

8.1. President's report

President's address as presented during the Congress.

My dear friends,

It is with great pleasure that we gather once again, in this beautiful city of Berlin for the 55th World Archery Congress immediately after the World Championships. This Congress is particularly special as we convene without the constraints of the pandemic, and it is heartening to see all of you as our delegates in good health.

Dear friends, as you know, our archery family continues to flourish, and I am delighted to acknowledge that our beloved sport remains a core part of the Olympic Programme for many



years. This achievement is the result of the Archery World Plan of course with your invaluable contributions and our collective efforts. Our success stems from the remarkable harmony within our organization, for which I extend my deepest appreciation to each and every one of you.

As many of you are aware, my other responsibilities within the Olympic Movement, involving the IOC, ASOIF, WADA, ITA, IMGA and the Turkish Olympic Committee, have imposed extensive travel. This, unfortunately, has meant that I could not attend all of our events. Nevertheless, I am grateful to our First Vice President Mario Scarzella, and Secretary General Tom Dielen, for admirably representing World Archery on different occasions. I must also acknowledge the contributions of our Vice Presidents Maria Emma Gaviria, Jörg Brokamp, and Thomas Han, who have shouldered similar responsibilities. My heartfelt thanks go out to each of them.

Building upon our discussions from the previous Congress in Yankton, please allow me to emphasize and reiterate some crucial aspects of our sport.

Let us reflect upon the critical situation faced by archery in 2005 when its place in the Olympic Programme was uncertain. Drawing inspiration from English naturalist Charles Darwin's words, "It is not the strongest of the species that survive, nor the most intelligent, but the one most adaptable to change" and IOC President Mr Thomas Bach also mentioned: "Change or to be changed".

I realised that survival is not determined by strength alone but by the ability to adapt to change. My firm resolve was to do new things, and do them differently, initiate new and innovative measures to secure archery's status as a core Olympic sport.

There was, and still is, an increasing demand for: good governance standards, transparency, accountability - in short, democracy - for all international sports organisations.

From my initial "10 Point Programme" to the dynamic "Archery World Plan," we embarked on our journey of transformation, and we have made remarkable progress in evolving from FITA to World Archery today.

We placed "credibility" at the forefront of our corporate identity. World Archery's corporate reputation has reached its zenith today. We have solidified archery's position as one of the core Olympic Sports, without encountering the debates faced by some other disciplines. The global appeal of archery is on the rise, and our Family has expanded to 170 Member Associations now.

We did that together! This has been a collective effort, bolstered by the unique qualities of our sport that we have consistently highlighted.

My dear friends, as you are aware, this term marks my final tenure as President, and I will be leaving my position during the next Congress, I feel compelled to remind you once more of our significant milestones.

Through the realization of the Archery World Plan's primary objectives, we have fostered innovation, evolution, and development. This resulted in remarkable accomplishments including:

- Introduction of the TV-friendly match and set system that has heightened the excitement of competitions,
- We all agree that archery is now more appealing to the media and more captivating to the viewers.



- Establishing the successful World Cup Series, made the sport more popular and attractive to spectators and elevated its profile and reach.
- Our dedication to sport development led to the establishment of the Foundation for International Archery Development, resulting in the esteemed World Archery Excellence Centre a project only a handful of international federations possess.
- Introduction and implementation of the sponsorship program which brought significant progress in marketing and broadcasting.
- Expanding our medal events in the Olympic Programme from four to five, with the inclusion of the mixed-team format, aiming for a fifty per cent gender balance.
- With the innovative integration of live biometric data, such as heart rate, into broadcasts, archery's TV and social media broadcasts have hit record highs in Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. Our secretary general Tom Dielen will inform you about some important details concerning this subject.

I would also like to express my gratitude to all our participants who contributed to the success of World Archery's collaboration as a significant partner in the Olympic ESports Week, it was held in Singapore at the end of June. Our Secretary General will provide you with more details regarding this achievement.

Furthermore, our Hyundai World Cup Series continues with great success as an important event platform for our athletes. It is worth mentioning that we have a new partner from China for our World Ranking system and I thank Sanlida for their support to the World Archery.

Looking ahead, I believe it is vital to address plans beyond the LA 2028 Olympic Games. We will continue our endeavors to include the Compound discipline in the Olympic Programme. In September, during the LA 2028 Programme discussions with the IOC Executive Board, we anticipate positive news. However, it is essential that we receive the utmost support and commitment from the US Archery, this is very vital for having this idea.

In conclusion, I extend my deepest appreciation for your unwavering dedication and support. I am confident that our beloved sport will continue to flourish. Let us march forward, united in our pursuit of excellence and the enduring spirit of archery.

8.2. Secretary General's report including Ad Hoc committees reports

The Secretary General made some additional remarks to the report that was published on 26 May as part of the Congress documents, and presented recent updates. He informed Congress on two corrections to the written report – it should have been Lucy "Trochet" instead of Lucy "Holderness" in item 14 and there was a phrase twice about exchange rate in item 9.

He started the presentation with a video summary showing the past two years, highlighting the return to international archery competitions after the COVID-19 outbreak.

He mentioned that it was in Germany the first time World Archery adopted the strategic plan during the 2007 Congress. A lot of progress has been made since then.

Olympic Games


Yesterday, invitations to Paris Olympic Games were sent to 203 National Olympic Committees. Paris is soon and he reminded we all have to be ready for it. There will be a Paris presentation tomorrow. Important decisions are coming in September about the possible inclusion of compound to the Los Angeles 2028 Olympic Games programme. Senegal will host the Youth



Olympic Games 2026 – a unique chance for Africa to make a step forward. Brisbane 2032 is not far away either.

Esports

Secretary General admitted he would not have imagined two years ago that he will show a presentation on esports in this Congress. Even less so to show archery as a success story from the start. We started discussions with the game publisher less than a year ago and the first version was shown just in February. Statistics were displayed.



All other sports existed longer than TicTacBow, the archery app, but we became the sixth most popular game. That signifies that we need to continue.

Events evaluation

It is important to gather data for evaluation from every event to understand the impact. We have done it in the past for certain events, but we want to do it for every competition in the future.


We do not have a budget to send an expert to each competition, so we have developed a formula how to do it in house and with help of our organising committees. We will be looking into the economic, image, social, sport and environmental aspects.

We started in Nimes with a spectator survey and in the future we will expand it to all events. He showed some basic data from major events in 2023 and said that the evaluation for Berlin event will be quite extensive.





We already know that there might be some data that will not always be available, but we have to collect as much as we can.




Spread of medals

The Secretary General congratulated the four countries that have won 44% of the medals across all international events – USA, China, India, Korea. There is work to be done by all others.

Good news is that in recent years we have also new countries who have climbed on the podium – Moldova, Slovakia, Guatemala, Lithuania, Latvia and Israel.





Betting

There has been betting in archery for many years. Mostly during Olympic Games, but so far without any control by World Archery in this area. World Archery was approached by a company to provide live results and video feed from events with the purpose of betting.

The goal for World Archery is not to make money but to be involved and have some sort of control of the situation. World Archery will provide educational tools to national federations. The Secretary General emphasized that no one with an international licence can bet on archery competitions or provide information to others who do bet.

This is not new, but the monitoring is getting stronger, so it is important to remind it to everyone involved.

Cooperation with International Testing Agency (ITA)

Cooperation is going well. Numbers and the distribution of the tests done in 2022 was shown:





He clarified that although World Archery is partnering with ITA – it is their decision who is tested, when and how to proceed with any positive cases. They have also started to provide educational programmes. There was also a booth and presentation in Ireland during the World Youth Championships both in English and Spanish.

There are still some positive cases due to food contamination. World Archery is working with ITA on this matter to find solutions and to make everyone aware of the risks.

TV distribution

World Archery has made great progress in this area. There are regular contracts with many channels.




Below is example of TV media monitoring (secondary only). It shows significant growth in TV due to the change in strategy. Comparing the Shanghai events in 2019 to 2023:

- Relationships with TV broadcasters making coverage much more available, including important partnerships in China, via state broadcasters CCTV, and India.
- o Increase in time of news covered in key markets of more than 15x.
- o Increase in news coverage reach of more than 700%.

If this trend continues throughout the year, we expect TV figures to increase significantly in 2023 compared to 2022.





- In 2017 and 2019 there was only one secondary broadcast covering the event in Shanghai. In 2023 there were 53 broadcasts in 5 different countries (56% coming from India).
- The Indian TV channel DD News, accounted for 39% of the total broadcasting time in 2023.
- The reach increased significantly by 727% to more than 19 million. Here, the most important channel by far was the Chinese channel CCTV5, which was responsible for 54% of the total reach.

This is a very small subset of the data, but we will get full overview by the end of the year.

There has been a change in approach from mainly streaming in 2018 to remote production in 2018 and now focusing more on distribution. World Archery should get a broadcast reach of 200 million by the end of the year.

The production is based on the following pyramid consept:




World Ranking Events are the foundation of the calendar and biggest area of opportunity for growth in television.

Social media

World Archery has had dramatic growth in the social media – especially in Facebook and Youtube.





There will also be a workshop on social media during the Congress by Redtorch – more specifically about social media by national federations.

Sustainability

Special workshop during the Congress. Idea to implement a strategy for all our events and activities to achieve a labelling of events.

Transgender


Very difficult and sensitive topic. There was a call with Member Associations who showed interest in this topic. New policy is coming out soon with the following principles:

- In case of transition from AFAB (birth as female) to male
 - Need to declare and provide some basic information
 - No testing period
- In case of transition from AMAB (birth as male) to female
 - 24 month testing period, 10 tests with min. 6 week interval
 - Must demonstrate that the concentration of testosterone in her serum has been less than 2.5 nmol/L
 - Cost of testing before claiming eligibility at the charge of the athlete
 - Expert panel and medical manager to be appointed
 - World Archery to have the right to test eligible athletes at international events (at World Archery cost)

Staff update

The Secretary General presented the office staff structure which has been quite stable.





Training Centres

There is a project to accredit and help develop training centres. Idea is to have a worldwide accreditation of venues. It is done in cooperation with World Academy of Sports. There are several plans for new centres and we want to make sure they are sustainable.

Projects that are in progress

- Archery+ was announced last year. Our own channel where people can access all content is in progress.
- Need to find a new way of doing publications (such as annual reports and Target magazine) since lack of resources.
- Educational pathway in development with WAoS and awaiting the arrival of a new resource and Marc Dellenbach.

Challenges with events

- Non respect of contractual conditions by Member Associations
 - o Late or non payment
 - o Late registration
- Lack of communication by Member Association with LOC
 - o Causes issues for other Member Associations
 - o Additional resources because of late information
- Lack of funding for LOCs
- Issues with VISAs for certain countries and effect on bookings

Governance Continental Associations

The overview was provided in the written report. As positive update – World Archery Africa has now functioning and informative website.

8.3. Affiliations¹

8.3.1. Report on membership applications

The Deputy Secretary General Siret Luik gave an overview of the temporary members and explained the recommendations by the Executive Board for the vote. The Secretary General opened the vote after the end of the presentation.

8.3.2. Vote on acceptance of new members

 Afghanistan Archery Federation – proposal by Executive Board to postpone full membership vote to next Congress. Reason: federation has a significant debt to LOCs related to cancellations.

Vote: 165 yes, 27 no, 9 abstention, 5 votes not cast (vote passed)

Decision: to keep the status as temporary member and postponement of affiliation to next Congress.

• **Curacao Archery Federation** – proposal by Executive Board to accept as full member. Info: very active, effort to develop, good communication, participation on continental level.

Vote: 202 yes, 3 no, 0 abstention, 1 vote not cast (vote passed)

Decision: to accept as full member.

• **Fédération Mauritanienne de Tir à l'Arc** – proposal by Executive Board to accept as full member. Info: long time interest to join World Archery, strong communication, present today.

Vote: 199 yes, 0 no, 5 abstention, 2 votes not cast (vote passed)

Decision: to accept as full member.

 Palestine Archery Federation – proposal by Executive Board to accept as full member.

Info: good communication and strong governance, difficulties related to equipment since considered as a weapon, but is actively working on finding solutions

Vote: 175 yes, 17 no, 8 abstention, 6 votes not cast (vote passed)

Decision: to accept as full member.

 Timor Leste Archery Federation – proposal by Executive Board to postpone full membership vote to next Congress. Reason: federation has been very passive with communication in last months, not benefitting from proposed development project.

Vote: 172 yes, 21 no, 11 abstention, 2 votes not cast (vote passed)

Decision: to keep the status as temporary member and postponement of affiliation to next Congress.

The CUW and MTN Member Associations were present. These two votes became effective after the approval of affiliation.

UZB voting right with TJK proxy became valid at this moment. It added four additional votes.

Vote count after this agenda item: 213 votes total (71 full members with 184 votes and 29 proxies).

8.4. Report on governance of Member Associations

Deputy Secretary General Siret Luik explained the process of creating the Member Associations' report before Congress. She thanked all national federations for their cooperation.

8.5. Exclusion of Non-financial and/or Non-Active Members

Expulsions: CAF, HAI, SKN

• **Fédération Centrafricaine de Tir à l'Arc (CAF)** – expulsion proposal by Executive Board. Reason: previous warnings and at the time of the Congress still not in good standing.

Vote: 180 yes, 15 no, 11 abstention, 7 votes not cast (vote passed).

Decision: expulsion of Fédération Centrafricaine de Tir à l'Arc.

• **Fédération Haïtienne de Tir à l'Arc (HAI)** – expulsion proposal by Executive Board. Reason: the membership fee is paid but is failing to prove its status as active member (less members than required, no national championships etc).

Vote: 195 yes, 3 no, 9 abstention, 6 votes not cast (vote passed).

Decision: expulsion of Fédération Haïtienne de Tir à l'Arc.

• **Saint Kitts and Nevis (SKN)** – expulsion proposal by Executive Board. Reason: previous warnings and at the time of the Congress still not in good standing.

Vote: 194 yes, 3 no, 7 abstention, 9 votes not cast (vote passed). **Decision:** expulsion of Saint Kitts and Nevis archery federation.

There are number of federations who are still active but are failing to fulfil complete membership requirements in various areas (depending on the case) – governance, failing to provide details to extranet, not filling in activities questionnaire that was sent by the staff earlier this year, not paying membership fee, not organising national championships. Due to previous warnings from past Congresses, it was not possible to issue another one and usually, the decision should be taken about expulsion. However, based on the proposal of the member services department, the Executive Board agreed that there should be a deadline given for those federations to prove their status as active member. In case conditions are met, there would not be an expulsion. If not they will be expelled at the end of the deadline.

8.6. Final warnings

Certain member associations are not in good standing and/or not fulfilling membership conditions at the time of the Congress, but have not received a warning from the Congress yet:

- Albanian Archery Federation (ALB) 2023 MA fee not paid;
- Montenegro Archery Association (MNE) 2023 MA fee not paid;
- Nigeria Archery Federation (NGR) unpaid invoice for WAYC 2023 (Limerick, IRL);
- Federacion Paraguaya de Tiro con Arco (PAR) late with membership fee payment and no answer to World Archery questionnaire;
- Russian Archery Federation (RUS) 2023 MA fee not paid;
- Somali Archery Federation (SOM) little proof of activity and less members than required by World Archery constitution;
- Syrian Arab Archery Federation (SYR) 2023 membership fee and international licenses not paid.
- Vanuatu Archery Association (VAN) questionnaire on activities was not submitted. Communication with federation is difficult. Not seeking for support when possible.

Vote: 190 yes, 10 no, 6 abstention, 7 votes not cast (vote passed).

Decision: to issue final warning to following member associations: Albania, Montenegro, Nigeria, Paraguay, Russia, Somalia, Syria, Vanuatu.

8.7. Measures in relation to the war in Ukraine related to Russia/Belarus

Presentation by the Ukrainian Congress delegate

Ukraine had previously requested to give presentation at the Congress. Their voting delegate Vladislav Sevryukov gave a short speech about the current situation of Ukrainian sport and the influence of Russian invasion.

World Archery working group on Russia and Belarus

The update was given by Vice President Jörg Brokamp, who chairs World Archery's working group on Russia and Belarus.

That group, whose other members are athlete committee chair Crystal Gauvin, executive board member Jean Michel Cleroy and Secretary General Tom Dielen, met on 10 May 2023 to define the sport's approach in relation to the recommendation of the IOC.

A procedure to independently vet participant neutrality was agreed. This procedure would require the submission of personal data on prospective athletes and officials by the archery federations of



Russia and Belarus. It would use an independent data company to complete a primary investigation into the neutrality of the listed persons, with a second vetting company available should further clarity be required.

It was also agreed that any individual who was linked to CSKA or Dynamo, two sports clubs linked to security forces, since the start of the war would not be deemed neutral. Letters outlining the conditions were sent to the two national federations on 12 May.

On 25 May, the archery federation of Belarus stated that it would not submit any applications until the federation of Ukraine lifted its opposition to Belarusian athletes' participation.

On 29 May, the archery federation of Russia responded by email to state it was working on lifting a restriction on supplying personal data. There has been subsequent communication on clarifying the process.

No assessment of the neutrality of prospective participants will begin until World Archery receives official acceptance of the proposed process from the national federations in Russia and Belarus.

The working group will continue to engage with both federations to implement the recommendation of the International Olympic Committee, and progress a return to competition for neutral athletes.

Only two major events remain on the World Archery calendar this year – next week's Hyundai World Archery Championships in Berlin and the fourth stage of the Hyundai Archery World Cup (and Olympic test event) on 15-20 August in Paris. The Hyundai Archery World Cup Final on 9-10 September is closed entry and requires prior qualification.

Since the procedure for assessing neutrality has not yet been agreed by the federations in Russia and Belarus, it is unlikely that athletes holding the passport of either nation will return to the field of play at a world competition in 2023.

8.8. Report on the International Foundation for the Development of Archery and the World Archery Excellence Centre

The Secretary General invites the World Archery Excellence Centre Director to the stage for his report. The Centre belongs to the International Foundation for the Development of Archery (FIDTA).



Mr Frederick Michel gave an overview of the centre activities, upcoming competitions, education programmes, elite programmes and changes in staffing. Howard Catherine joined the staff earlier this year and Marc Dellenbach will start working as head coach in September.

9. IOC presentation²

The International Olympic Committee President addressed the Congress through a video recording. In his message he brought out the significance of the upcoming Berlin World Championships which officially opens the Olympic qualification period. He emphasized World Archery and IOC strong partnership on implementing agenda 2020+5 and the strong focus on UN sustainable development goals.

He reminded that sport must always build bridges, open pathways and foster understanding between people and nations – this is the modest contribution to peace the sport can offer.

President Bach congratulated everyone in World Archery and thanked for their great work on building a strong foundation.

He stated that archery is one of the oldest sports of human kind and it continues to convey skills and qualities that are so relevant in the modern world today – precision, focus and determination. It is also an inclusive sport, open to everyone regardless the age or ability.

He mentioned his recent visit to the World Archery Excellence Centre and displayed pictures of the activity. He also displayed the medal to confirm the success on the shooting line.

He wished fruitful discussions for the Congress and thanked the World Archery President for the great cooperation.

10. Finances

All of the documents were published before the Congress deadlines.


10.1. Finance and Audit Board Report 2021-2022

The Financial Statements of 2021-2022 together with Finance and Audit Board reports, which were audited by Price Waterhouse Coopers, were provided with the Congress documents.

The Chair of the Finance and Audit Board, Rolf Lind gave a short summary of their working process and explained how to interpret the auditors report – which for World Archery was very good.

No questions were raised on the Finance and Audit Board reports.

Secretary General Tom Dielen explained further the income, expenses and cashflow.



Tom Dielen also brought out potential concerns:

- CHF is getting stronger and stronger every day
- Inflation and expenses increasing
- Cost of the Excellence Centre for the future



 Need to have further resources to guarantee the services of the federation due to many new projects

10.2. Audited accounts / auditor's report 2021

There were no questions raised about the audited accounts.

It was decided to vote on this item together with the next one.

10.3. Audited accounts / auditor's report 2022

2021 and 2022 audited accounts were put on vote at the same time.

Vote: 196 yes, 2 no, 4 abstention, 11 votes not cast (vote passed).

Decision: approval of 2021 and 2022 audited accounts.

10.4. Financial programme 2023-2035

The Financial programme was published with Congress documents (four pages).

The Secretary General explained that programme is in line with decision of 2021 Congress to allocate Olympic revenues to the accounts yearly.

It was based on the new mortgage agreement with Credit Suisse for the centre to move away from a capital repayment every 4 years to a semestrial payment till 2035.

Vote: 195 yes, 0 no, 2 abstention, 16 votes not cast (vote passed).

Decision: approval of financial programme 2023-2028.

10.5. Member association fees proposal

The Executive Board proposed to double the base unit to calculate the membership fee from 40 CHF to 80 CHF. This does not make a huge difference for the bigger federations, but will remain still symbolic compared to many other sports for smaller federations.

The Secretary General reminded that 100% of the fees go to finance continental associations activities and development.

Vote: 139 yes, 51 no, 14 abstention, 9 votes not cast (vote passed).



Decision: to use 80 CHF as base unit to calculate the membership fee for 2024 and onwards, the calculation system remains the same.

10.6. Approval of type of audit and the auditors' firm

Secretary General gave an overview of the tender that was done. The tender was sent to five companies and we received four offers. There was also question on the type of the audit and Finance and Audit Board made their suggestions to Executive Board who supported the majority opinion of the Finance and Audit Board. Therefore, it is proposed to Congress to continue with an ordinary audit and use PWC as auditors' firm for 2023-2024.

Vote: 192 yes, 4 no, 10 abstention, 7 votes not cast (vote passed).

Decision: to continue with ordinary audit and use PWC as auditors' firm for 2023-2024.

11. Interpretations of rules by permanent committees

Since no questions were raised in relation to the interpretations between Congresses 2021-2023 they were submitted for approval "en bloc".

Vote: 180 yes, 0 no, 0 abstention, 33 votes not cast (vote passed).

Decision: to approve interpretations from 2021-2023.

The Secretary General thanked the committee members for their hard work in providing the interpretations.

12. Bylaws adopted by the Executive Board

The Secretary General informed Congress that no request was made to discuss a particular by-law by the deadline provided in the Constitution (28 April 2023). Therefore, the bylaws would be voted upon "en bloc".

However, the Austria federation informed after the deadline that they would like to raise discussion on one specific bylaw. Secretary General gave the floor to Bettina Kratzmueller.

Bettina Kratzmueller (AUT) – Some of the W1 athletes need an assistant to help them to put arrows on the bow because they cannot do it themselves. Most of them are using strapping and they are fixed to the wheelchair, so they cannot move much. They can be allowed to have an assistant. The new bylaw says that the assistants must remain silent and not to coach the athletes. At the same time there was also an interpretation that says that no athletes can use electronic devices for scoping. She would like to raise this topic, because something has to be done regards this bylaw.



She previously spoke with the chair of the Para Archery Committee, Dominique Ohlmann, who said that they need to discuss it further, but no change can be done before the Paris Paralympics. Thank you!

Mark Miller (chair of the Constitution and Rules Committee) – There are two issues. From constitutional standpoint, our Congress procedures are quite clear that unless there is a written submission to our Secretary General at least 30 days before publication of final Congress documents, all bylaws have to be voted on together. Fortunately for the purposes of this Congress, we already looked into the timings related to approval of bylaws and the C&R sees that this vote must be in block. However – for the practical issue, I have also spoken with the chairperson of the Para Archery Committee and he has said they will re-examine the bylaw and determine if there is a way to address the issue you are raising in a means that it is fair for everyone.

Tom Dielen confirmed that all bylaws will be voted "en bloc". The discussion on the topic has started. There will be new members to the committee, we will continue discussion and include also their opinion. There was also bylaw proposal by US Archery on the same topic presented to the Executive Board meeting prior to Congress – that could some address some issues, but cause some further ones. This bylaw change was delayed and will be discussed by the next board meeting. The current committee has three current or former para athletes, so it was discussed from an athletes' perspective. There is commitment to discuss further, but the qualification period has already started and it will be difficult to get agreement from IPC to make changes before the Paris Paralympics.

Vote: 181 yes, 5 no, 6 abstention, 21 votes not cast (vote passed).

Decision: to approve bylaws from 2021-2023 (excluding the ones after 28 April 2023 since after Congress deadline).

13. Board of Justice and Ethics report

The report was submitted in writing together with pre-Congress documents. There were no questions raised by the Congress.

14. Permanent committees reports and goals

Committee reports were provided together with the Congress documents. Secretary General Tom Dielen offered the floor to raise questions about the reports. No questions were raised.

Tom Dielen thanked all committee chairpersons and members for their great contribution and cooperation over the past years!



15. World Archery plan

The Secretary General gave a short overview of the general strategy that has remained the same since last Congress:

- Vision: A world in which everyone has the opportunity to practice, engage with or enjoy the important Olympic sport of archery.
- Mission:
 - To empower its Member Associations to make archery a leading sport in nations around the world
 - o To build and regulate an event ecosystem
 - o To grow awareness and engagement with the sport
- Values: Precision, intensity, innovation, heritage, fairplay, sport for all.

He also gave an overview of the current status of progress on various goals. The financial/organisational goals are in general on track of achieving necessary reserves for the future as planned.

World Archery staff - heads of departments for events, communication and member services - gave their presentations about the progress in various areas.

Thomas Aubert, head of events, went deeper in the areas where more work still needs to be done.

- Event pathway a change in the World Ranking system is already done but the goal is to raise the quality of World Ranking events and to reach a standard model for World Cup stages. To achieve it, it is planned to have an event supervisor training tool and structure. World Ranking events all receive support in terms of media coverage.
- Spectator strategy Currently lacking the control and feedback about spectators. The
 goal is to change people's mindset, and how they engage with archery. That will include
 ticketing at all events, investment and additional budget for sport presentation. World
 Archery will work with LOCs to take more responsibility in public entertainment and
 engagement.
- Hospitality programmes currently inconsistent quality level of hospitality areas, need to develop service to sponsors and guests, must use events as a social platform around the sport, between sponsors and prospects.

Chris Wells, head of communication and media, explained that the goals for their department are less concrete than for example event department goals.

- Social medial and broadcast area development has been positive and successful in general.
- Building a superstar athlete it is difficult to make that change as a single person or organisation. We cannot tell what people's perception should be. That is why last couple of years has focused on brands feeding into the World Archery ecosystem that started with Archer World Cup in 2006 and continued with Indoor World Cup that eventually changed to Indoor World Series. For the Tokyo Games, for the first time we had a brand for archery which contributed quite heavily on us being one of the most popular sports on digital media during the Olympics. We have done the same thing for Paris, but we just started earlier. There is also the Archery + platform and content side of it. All these sub-brands are



- feeding into World Archery to attract audiences. Even though we are doing this with a small team, we build the reach, and these subtle changes make a big difference.
- National federations already have products national teams and major events. It is necessary to recognise these products and treating them as identities that belong to your audiences as an important step to achieve growth.
- Pyramid of events approach World Ranking Events being the base, World Cup in the
 middle and Championships and Olympics as the peak. There is a lot of progress done at
 every level, for example the Veronicas Cup that is in constant progress Slovenian TV took
 the news of the winning athletes, Asia Cup in Singapore local broadcaster provider is still
 working with us, the cooperation in Croatia resulted in a good contact, through Archery GB
 a distribution agreement with Channel 4 for the World Para Archery championships.
- Signpost to participation not implemented yet, but should be the way forward.

Siret Luik - head of member services.

- Size of federations currently no federation who would officially declare more than 100,000 members.
- Number of federations the goal is to have strong members, on track in this area.
- Volunteer federations improving, currently on 55%
- Number of events registered slightly reduced due to COVID-19 and the effect after
- Participation at para archery events 55 countries in Pilsen
- Way forward the key is sharing the knowledge and learning from each other. Athletes are competitors on the shooting lines, but if federations get stronger, the whole sport benefits.
- Knowledge sharing programme was launched first time in 2022, but not with too many applications. Variety of areas where each federation could apply.
- Equipment support programme limited, but yearly programme.
- Education together with World Academy of Sport rebranding of the whole education system to help to develop tools that would be helpful for federations.

Tom Dielen summarised the topic with the promise of reporting on progress in every Executive Board meeting. He also highlighted the importance of the spectator and hospitality side of events.

He also mentioned that for the launch of the ticket sales of the Paralympics IPC has contracted Matt Stutzman since he is becoming a super para star and shows the way forward.

16. Associate international federations and other cooperations³

16.1. Report on cooperation with Commonwealth Games Federation

The Secretary General gave an overview of the situation that once again Archery was not included in the program. He also thanked the members of the working group and Archery Australia for their efforts to include the sport in the program. In the meantime the Games as such are at risk of not being held in 2026.

16.2. Report on cooperation with IFAA

The Secretary General informed the Congress that he spoke with the IFAA President and had invited him but that due to an IFAA event taking place at the same time he could not attend. An agreement was made to discuss at a more regular interval on cooperation. IFAA is looking to start a discussion at UNESCO level to have archery recognised as part of the human heritage and wants a cooperation with World Archery on this. We will follow up on this matter.

16.3. Report on cooperation with FISU

As the World University Games are taking place at the same time, it was impossible for FISU to send someone to our Congress. We had a successful discussion with FISU to move archery to the start of the Games so there was no overlap of the finals but it was impossible for some athletes to compete in both events. This should not happen in the future.

16.4. Report on cooperation with GSD

The Secretary General reported on the success of the cooperation with GSD and mentioned that World Archery was deeply saddened by the passing of the chair of GSD. We will however continue to cooperate with the foundation and look forward to welcoming them in Paris during the Olympic Games.

16.5. Report on cooperation with Archery Trade Association

A video report was made available to Congress by ATA which will be annexed to the minutes of the meeting. This report mentioned the work being done by ATA on helping coaches and dealers to better trained on equipment and tuning. For compound we see this as a development opportunity at all levels and for recurve we will look into developing especially the higher level of equipment knowledge.

17. Motions and proposals for laws

There were 22 motions and 1 proposal, which were provided beforehand with Congress documents, in addition to the two online calls that were specifically held to introduce the motions.

Presented below is a summary table with the outcome of voting along with details of discussions that were raised. The table follows the order of motions as they were published before the Congress.

All motions passed the Congress vote, some with amendments.

It was proposed and accepted by Congress delegates that motions will come in effect on 15 January 2024 as was the case in the previous Congress.

The wording of the approved motions is added as APPENDIX 3.

Discussion during the presentation of motions, before the vote. The below is not a transcription of the entire discussions, but a summary of questions/arguments.

Motion 11 - 3D World Championships to take place on even years

Hannah Brown (GBR) – there are only two events for field and 3D archers. This motion means that field and 3D championships will be happening at the same year. She highlighted the financial and time contribution of athletes and federations in relation to this.

Tom Dielen – it was already discussed with the continental bodies that continental events would not be the same years as World Championships.

Motion 12 with amendments - creating U15 youth categories

After the 2nd amendment was approved:

Hilda Gibson (GBR) – which part of the rulebook should it be?

Tom Dielen – constitution and rules committee checked that the proposed location is logical, however the new composition of the committee will review it if necessary. It is important to understand that it does not create World Records or add age categories to World Archery Youth Championships.

After the motion with two amendments was approved and discussion on U13 started.

Kevin McDermot (IRL) – should the U13 amendment be a completely new motion and not discussed at this time?

Mark Miller (chairperson of constitution and rules committee) – agreed, it is a substantial change and should be separate motion and not voted on as amendment and therefore cannot be put on the table in this Congress.

Motion 13 – para archery doubles

Dominique Ohlmann (chairperson of para archery committee) thanked the Executive Board for the original approval of the bylaw when we went from three-person teams to two-person teams called doubles. It has really increased the team participation – in Pilsen there would have been only 18 countries taking part in the team event, while with doubles it was possible to have 34 countries. It has also increased female participation. This motion is to make the rulebook consistent and in all parts of rulebook the three-person teams for para would be changed to doubles.

Motion 14 - removing the pools for field and 3D archery

Bettina Kratzmueller (AUT) – "we do not agree with this motion. The reasoning that it is too complicated is not justified because the field of play will stay the same with this change. Also since the introduction many organisers have successfully delivered it. With this change the number of athletes going to eliminations will drop and also the importance of qualification round will reduce because the current format gives advantage to higher ranked athletes. Additionally, the fact that it will still be used for The World Games it creates a situation where World Championships and World Games have different formats – Therefore it does not make sense.

Hannah Brown (chairperson of field and 3D committee) – this motion has taken feedback from athletes, officials, organisers and result teams. It is more complex to organise and understand pool matches than head to head matches. With this change – it will reduce the space and time that is required for matches. I can't see a problem with having two sets of rules.



Arnaud ... (NED) – it seems that the proposal is missing athlete committee opinion? I hear from my athletes a different opinion, but field and 3D committee said that they were consulted.

Hannah Brown - athletes participating at field and 3D competitions were consulted.

Rifaat Chabouk (ESP) – our clubs like to use the same format as World Archery uses, but it is definitely easier for clubs to set up head to head format of the competition and remove the pools.

Motion 16 - field and 3D team composition, four instead of three to include all bow categories

Bettina Kratzmueller (AUT) – Making the order of shooting at the red peg mandatory makes the competition more safe from a security point of view. The time stayed the same but now one more athlete. When the terrain is not flat this could cause issues, which is why teams need more time. A last point is that the arrow should only be removed from the quiver while standing at the shooting peg like in target archery with team rounds. Once again a safety issue. Austria supports the change to 4 archers but proposes these amendments to increase the safety issues.

Hannah Brown – In terms of having the arrow taking out. Contrary to target there is no 1m line and therefore the judges cannot enforce the rule. For the red peg shooting first. The teams are not shooting at the same time and it is a team format and therefore it should be a team decision. In terms of the timing after the 1st arrow is shot they know the distance and therefore they don't need additional time.

Proposal 1 - Creating Youth categories for Para Archery

Sergio Font – World Archery Americas: We should have a different age limit than for other youth categories to have enough athletes. Participation by young athletes is very important but the numbers are very low.

Dominique Ohlman – Para Committee: The physical strength of someone that is 27 or 28 years old is not the same as a 16-year-old especially for para-athletes. The distance should be also adopted to young para athletes since shooting at long distance is unrealistic. So they propose to keep U21 but have them shoot at 18m rather than a longer distances.

Sergio Font – Vote on having a youth category and that it is further studied.

Tom Dielen – no vote on amendment. A vote is on the study and the idea is to introduce a youth category and with a format to be defined.

Candidates presentations and workshop on Media

At the end of the first day of Congress a presentation by the candidates for 1st Vice President and Vice President's positions was organised as well as a Media Workshop. The congress delegates after the close of the first day of Congress were also able to view the videos of all other candidates for the elections.

Appendix 3: Approved motions

Motion 1

Various Articles in Rule Book

World Archery, working with the C&R Committee, is authorized to revise the Rule Book as World Archery deems reasonable and appropriate to lessen the use of gender references such as "he", "she", "him" or "her".

Motion 2

Book 1, Chapter 1, Article 1.6.5

Revise to read as follows:

1.6.5 Persons elected to World Archery offices shall serve a term of four years unless otherwise specified with the following limitations:



- The person elected may serve a maximum of four full terms in the same committee or board (except the Executive Board) and must have a minimum two-year break after two consecutive full terms;
- The individual elected or appointed as the president, <u>first vice president</u>, vice president or a member of the Executive Board may serve a maximum of three full terms in the same position. Outgoing officer can be a candidate for a different position.

Transitional procedure: this rule (1.6.5.) will not be applied in 2019 and 2021 elections, but will be in full effect in the

2023 elections.

Motion 3

1.7.2 Each Member Association shall be allowed one voting delegate and no more than two other delegates, provided that if there are three (3) delegates in total, both sexes must be presented. Continental Associations and Associate International Federations may be represented by no more than two delegates. Associate Members may be represented by no more than one delegate. Each Member Association shall submit written authority signed by the Member Association naming its voting delegate and an alternative voting delegate at least 21 days 28 days before the start of Congress.

1.7.4 The vote of a Member Association may be cast by proxy only by another Member Association. No Member Association may carry more than one proxy, each proxy may only carry one vote. Each proxy shall be in writing, signed by the Member Association from which it is given and the Member Association which has accepted the proxy, and it shall be submitted to the Secretary General at least 30 days 21 days before the start of the Congress. No Member Association may give a proxy unless that Association is in good standing.

Motion 4

Book 1, Chapter 1, Article 1.12.6

Add the following bullet points to 1.12.6:

- When urgent, take decisions normally assumed by the Congress, except election of Executive Board Members, expulsion of a Member Association, changes to the Constitution and dissolution of World Archery. Any changes proposed by the Executive Board in an emergency situation will be circulated to the Member Associations and if more than 50% of valid votes available from the Member Associations object in writing to the Executive Board within 3 working days of notice being given, the change will not be implemented, and the matter will be referred to the next Congress. Otherwise, the Executive Board's decision to revise the rule(s), to suspend a Member Association or other matter for the urgent situation will stand until the next Congress. In such a case the decision, if it is to be made permanent, must be approved by the next Congress in accordance with the constitutional requirements at that Congress.
- The Executive Board may propose an item to the Congress as an 'Emergency Motion' without the prescribed notice period. These items may be considered by the Congress if two-thirds (2/3) of all eligible Member Associations are represented and two-thirds (2/3) of the votes submitted are in favour of consenting to deal with it.

rules set out in the World Archery Anti-Doping Rules conflict with the CAS ADD Rules, the CAS ADD Rules shall prevail.

- The Team Elimination Round, in which the top 24 teams (16 in the Olympic Games) of three athletes seeded according to their positions as determined by their total score in the Qualification Round (see Appendix 3-Match Play Charts, 8. Match Play Chart 5 (24 teams, byes are permitted)) shoot simultaneously a series of matches, each match for recurve and barebow consisting of the best of four sets of six arrows (two per athlete) and for compound consisting of four ends of six arrows (two per athlete) in cumulative score;
- In Para-Archery, the Doubles Elimination Round in which the top 24 teams of two athletes seeded according to their positions as determined by their total score in the Qualification Round (see 58 Appendix 3-Match Play Charts, 8. Match Play Chart 5 (24 Doubles, byes are permitted)) shoot simultaneously a series of matches, each match for recurve open consisting of the best of four sets of four arrows (two per athlete) and for compound open and W1 consisting of four ends of four arrows (two per athlete) in cumulative score;
- The Team Finals Round, in which the four teams qualifying from the Elimination Round shoot a series of matches, each match for recurve and barebow consisting of the best of four sets of six arrows (two per athlete) and for compound and W1 consisting of four ends of six arrows (two per athlete) in cumulative score culminating in the Team Gold Medal match. In the Olympic Games, the Medal matches of the World Archery Championships and Archery World Cup Events, the teams shoot alternately in three arrow segments. For other events alternating shooting is optional. The timing is started and stopped when the athlete crosses the 1m line;
- In Para-Archery, the Doubles Finals Round, in which the four doubles qualifying from the Elimination Round shoot a series of matches, each match for recurve open consisting of the best of four sets of four arrows (two per athlete) and for Compound Open and W1 consisting of four ends of four arrows (two per athlete) in cumulative score culminating in the Doubles Gold Medal match. In the Paralympic Games and the Medal matches of the World Archery Championships, the doubles shoot alternately in two arrow segments. For other events alternating shooting is optional. For more information on W1, please see Article 21.4.3. in Book 3;
- The Mixed Team Round in which the top 24 teams (16 in the Olympic Games) composed of the top ranked man and the top ranked woman from the same Member Association are seeded according to their positions as determined by their total score in the Qualification Round (see Appendix 3-Match Play Charts, 8. Match Play Chart 5 (24 teams, byes are permitted)), shoot simultaneously a series of matches, each match for recurve and barebow consisting of the best of four sets of four arrows (two per athlete) and for compound and W1 consisting of four ends of four arrows (two per athlete) in cumulative score. The format may be amended to fit special stadiums and locations that are very attractive for archery. It is necessary to notify Member Associations of such an amendment at least one year in advance of the event. For Recurve the round will be called the Olympic Round and shall be shot at 70m (60m for Under 18 and 50+) on 122cm target faces, whereas for compound it will be called the Compound Match Round and shall be shot at 50m on an 80cm six ring target face. For Barebow it will be called the Barebow Match Round and shall be shot at 50m on an 122cm target face.
- A team shall consist of the highest ranked three (or two if a Mixed Team or two in a Double in Paraarchery) athletes from the Qualification Round unless the Team Manager notifies the official approved result verifier or the Chairman of Judges in writing at least fifteen minutes before the start of official practice of that round of competition of a substitution of another athlete who competed in the Qualification Round. A violation of the foregoing will result in disqualification of the team. In case of substitution medals shall only be awarded to the athletes that shot the Team/Mixed Team/Doubles round, not the qualification round.

For ties regarding the entrance to the Elimination Rounds, entrance into the top two there shall be shoot-offs to break the ties:

- For Field rounds, the shoot-offs shall take place on a target at the maximum distance or the division;
- For 3D rounds, the shoot-offs shall take place at distance placed by the judge;
- Shoot-offs shall be shot as soon as it is practical after all scorecards for the division, within which the tie has occurred, have been recorded. Any athlete who is not present for the shoot-off within 30 15 minutes after he or his Team Manager has been notified, shall forfeit the shoot-off. If the athlete and his Team Manager have left the field, in spite of the



results not being officially verified, and thus cannot be notified of the shoot-off, the athlete shall forfeit the shoot-off.

For ties for the progress from one stage of the competition to the next other than as provided in Article 25.3.2 or for deciding the Medal placements after a Finals Round there shall be shoot-offs to break the ties:


Shoot-offs shall be shot as soon as it is practical after all scorecards for the division, within which the tie has occurred, have been recorded. Any athlete who is not present for the shoot-off within 30 minutes after he or his Team Manager has been notified, shall forfeit the shoot-off. If the athlete and his Team Manager have left the field, in spite of the results not being officially verified, and thus cannot be notified of the shoot-off, the athlete shall forfeit the shoot-off. At the completion of the match after the judge has declared the tie.

World Archery and sustainability

At the World Archery Congress 2023 Arnoud Strijbis, chair of the sustainability committee, presented what World Archery is doing at the topic of sustainability. In this interactive workshop WA members reflected. In this memo a summarize of these outcomes.






Environment is the key word, when WA members think about sustainability. Also 'green energy', 'life', 'innovation', 'renewable', 'responsibility', 'nature', 'reuse', 'recycling', 'progress' and 'hope' were mentioned more than once.

Costs and sustainability

In the workshop the question was raised if sustainability may cost money.



We can conclude that investing in sustainability is not an issue for WA members. Awareness of costs is necessary, but with a good story and a good program sustainable solutions are in line with the ideas of WA members.

Sion

At the Youth Cup in Sion WA did a research about sustainability measures. The reuse of targets was the most liked measure.





UN Goals

In the presentation the UN Goals were explored. Members were asked what was the most important goal for them.



It became very clear that the 'quality of education' is the most important goal for WA members. Next to this goal also 'no poverty' and 'zero hunger' are important, followed by 'clean water'.

The topic 'Sustainability' gives World Archery the change to be 'green'. But next to this it is an opportunity to express the social part of archery. This reflection of our members gives us a clear message that acting on education, poverty, hunger and clean water is important. Showing a 'social green' face is an opportunity towards members, but also sponsor propositions.



Member Associations and sustainability



'Recycling targets', the base of acting sustainable is next to 'nothing', what our Member Associations are doing on the topic of sustainability. 'Nothing' is a serious problem or a serious change. It is simply a different way to look at the topic. We can also conclude that we have a lot of space for a policy on sustainability, and practicing sustainable.

Smaller items: bottles, water, skins, butts, recycling material and working from home. This also contributes to sustainability of archery.



Our Member Associations ask WA for a policy on sustainability and support. They also ask for other things, not directly related to sustainability. The headlines are:

1. Money.

- Events including congress have to be cheaper or even free of charge;
- o Investments in recyclable target faces;
- o Lower membership fees (later the vote was to double the fees);
- Reduction of costs of tournaments;
- Money should not be a priority; and
- o (Help to) find sponsors for sustainability.

2. Program



- o Guidelines and encouragement to take appropriate measures (clear concept);
- o Strategy that can be followed by MAs with keeping in mind the different sizes;
- o Focus on larger issues (not only water bottles);
- Support and education (guidance);
- Best practices;
- o Role models; and
- o Communication.
- 3. Measures / examples
 - o Avoid the need to fly, schedule on a different way;
 - o Promote one-site competition, reachable by public transport;
 - o Instructions for digital competitions;
 - o Apps events; and
 - o Water bottles.
