



Welcome to Czechoslovakia!



Procès-Verbal du XVIIe Congrès International de Tir à l'Arc

Minutes of the XVIIth International Archery Congress

Helsinki, 1955

Ière Partie

Le 18 juillet 1955 à 14 H. au Societethuset Restaurant, Helsinki.

Avant l'ouverture du Congrès le Président fit part aux délégués du décès du Dr. Bronislaw Pierzchala, Pologne, Président de la FITA jusqu'en 1939 et ensuite Président d'Honneur et de Mrs. Nettleton, Angleterre, la "Grand Old Lady of Archery". Une minute de silence fut observée à leur mémoire.

I. Ouverture du Congrès

A l'appel nominal les représentants qualifiés des Fédérations suivantes répondirent:

Le Président, le Secrétaire-Général et le Trésorier temporaire Mr. Torsten Fahlman, étaient également présents, ainsi que des représentants de plusieurs Fédérations affiliées et un observateur d'Allemagne.

Le Président constate la validité des droits de vote et ouvre la séance du XVII^e Congrès International du Tir à l'Arc.

II. Faculté de participer au Championnat du Monde de Tir à l'Arc 1955

Le Trésorier constata que toutes les Fédérations Nationales de Tir à l'Arc présentes avaient payé leur cotisation annuelle, sauf la Pologne, qui promit de régler le solde de Cour. Suèd. 50.— sans retard ultérieur. Ensuite il fut décidé que tous les archers inscrits étaient admis à participer au Tournoi de Championnat du Monde 1955.

III. Affiliation de Nouvelles Fédérations de Tir à l'Arc

Le Secrétaire-Général rapporte que les pays suivants avaient formellement demandé leur affiliation: Le Canada, le Cuba, les Indes, l'Italie, le Luxembourg, la Turquie et le Vénézuéla. Le Trésorier rapporta ensuite que toutes ces nations, sauf les Indes, l'Italie et le Vénézuéla avaient payé leur première cotisation annuelle.

Le Congrès décida d'accepter le Canada, le Cuba, le Luxembourg et la Turquie. Les Indes et le Vénézuéla seraient également admis après paiement de leur première cotisation annuelle, avant le 1 janvier 1956. Mr. Kessels s'opposa à la candidature de l'Italie, dès lors ce pays ne fut pas accepté.

IV. Voyants de contrôle à la traction autorisés au Tournoi de Championnat du Monde 1955.

Le Congrès accepta la proposition du Président que des "voyants de contrôle à la traction" seraient autorisés au Tournoi du Championnat du Monde 1955. Seules votèrent contre: la Pologne et la Tchéco-Slovaquie.

V. Nouveau règlement pour les équipes gagnantes

Le Congrès accepta la modification suivante du dernier paragraphe de l'Article 47 B. du règlement FITA, proposé par la Grande-Bretagne:

1. l'équipe qui comporte le tireur ayant réalisé le meilleur score au grand total.
2. l'équipe qui comporte le tireur ayant réalisé le deuxième meilleur score au grand total.
3. l'équipe qui comporte le tireur ayant réalisé le troisième meilleur score au grand total.

En cas d'égalité, les équipes seront classées ex-aequo.

Part I

At the Societethuset Restaurant, Helsinki, on July 18th, 1955, at 2 p. m.

Before the opening of Congress the President informed the Delegates of the death of Dr. Bronislaw Pierzchala, Poland, President of FITA until 1939 and thereafter Honorary President, and of Mrs. Nettleton, England, the "Grand Old Lady of Archery". Their Memory was honoured by a silent minute.

I. Opening of Congress

The President, the General Secretary and the temporary Treasurer, Mr. Torsten Fahlman, were also present, together with extra Representatives from several Member Associations, and an Observer from Germany.

The President confirmed that the qualified Representatives present were all entitled to vote, and opened the Meeting of the XVII^e International Archery Congress.

II. Qualification for competing in the World Championship Tournament of 1955

The Treasurer verified that all the National Archery Associations present except Poland had paid their annual fees. Poland promised to pay the remaining 50 Sw. Crowns without any delay, after which it was decided that all archers entered were entitled to compete in the World Championship Tournament of 1955.

III. Affiliation of New Archery Associations

The General Secretary reported that the following countries had formally asked for affiliation: Canada, Cuba, India, Italy, Luxembourg, Turkey and Venezuela. The Treasurer then reported that all of these Nations except India, Italy and Venezuela had paid their first annual fee.

Congress decided to accept Canada, Cuba, Luxembourg and Turkey. India and Venezuela will also be accepted, if they pay their first annual fee before January 1st, 1956. M. Kessels objected to Italy, after which Italy was not accepted.

IV. Draw Check Indicators permitted at the 1955 World Championship Tournament

Congress accepted the President's suggestion that Draw Check Indicators should be accepted at the 1955 World Championship Tournament. Only Poland and Czechoslovakia voted against the suggestion.

V. New Rule for winning Teams

Congress accepted the following change of the last sentence of the FITA Rules, Art. 47, B, suggested by Great Britain:

1. The team containing the archer making the highest Grand Total score;
2. The team containing the archer making the second highest Grand Total score;
3. The team containing the archer making the third highest Grand Total score.

If a tie exists after this, the teams shall be declared equal.

VI. Le Championnat du Monde 1955

X. Rapport présidentiel

Le rapport présidentiel, distribué séparément, fut accepté à l'unanimité.

XI. Rapport financier 1953—1955

Le rapport financier du Trésorier pour 1953—55, distribué séparément, fut accepté à l'unanimité.

XII. Rapport Olympique

Le Secrétaire-Général rapporta que la FITA fut officiellement invitée à envoyer deux délégués au Congrès du C. O. I. à Paris du 12 au 18 juillet 1955. Le comité exécutif désigna en premier lieu Mr. Kjellson et Mr. Ekegren, cependant par la suite Mr. Kjellson, devenu gravement malade, fut remplacé par M. Kessels. Les fédérations de Tir à l'Arc française et belge avaient mis au point une démonstration de tir pour les délégués olympiques le 12 juillet au Polo de Bagatelle. Cette démonstration fut un succès. Malgré la pluie, environ 35 nations furent présentes et les nombreux nouveaux contacts personnels ont déjà donné des résultats positifs. Il était assez étonnant que les délégués officiels de la FITA n'eurent pas l'autorisation de participer aux assemblées. Ils ont néanmoins fait de leur mieux pour prendre contact avec les délégués olympiques, en leur donnant tous les renseignements désirés au sujet du tir à l'arc.

Le 17 juillet la question du tir à l'arc fut à l'ordre du jour, malheureusement simultanément avec quelques autres branches de sport, et notre requête fut déclinée à la majorité des voix. Beaucoup de pays pratiquant le tir à l'arc s'abstinent ou votèrent contre le tir à l'arc. Le secrétaire-général termina en exposant qu'un plus grand nombre de nations affiliées travaillant en coopération serrée avec leurs comités olympiques nationaux respectifs, signifierait plus de voix et plus de succès à l'avenir.

Il remercia également les organisateurs de la démonstration de tir, avec une mention spéciale pour M. Demare, M. Bédard et M. Kessels. Mr. Hiekamies, M. Massard, Mr. Ekelund et Mr. von Frenckell furent également d'une aide considérable. Le rapport fut accepté à l'unanimité.

Mr. Kessels remercia le Secrétaire-Général et proposa que la FITA offrirait une somme symbolique à la Fédération française, pour couvrir une partie des dépenses encourues lors de la démonstration de tir. Ceci fut accepté à l'unanimité et il fut décidé que le Comité Exécutif examinerait quel montant serait attribué.

XIII. Rapport de la Commission technique

Le rapport de la Commission Technique du XVII^e Tournoi de Championnat du Monde fut lu par le Président, Mr. Mark Savonius (Finlande) et accepté à l'unanimité.

XIV. Cotisation annuelle

Se basant sur le rapport financier Mr. Poulsen suggéra une augmentation de Cour. Suéd. 100 à C. S. 200.— par nation. Acceptée avec 2 voix contre. Mr. Hunter proposa que ces Cour. Suéd. 200.— comporterait 5 exemplaires gratuits de chaque bulletin. Cette proposition fut également acceptée.

XV. Election de Membres du Conseil Administratif

Mr. C. W. Nettleton, Grande-Bretagne, M. Jaroslav Lenecek, Tchécoslovaquie et M. Oscar Kessels, Belgique, furent réélus à l'unanimité comme Vice-présidents de la FITA de 1955 à 1959.

Mr. Robert Neerby, Norvège, Mr. Roger Bédard, France et Mr. E. J. Parker, Afrique du Sud, furent réélus comme membres du Conseil pour la même période. Les nouveaux membres du conseil furent Mrs. Jean Richards, USA élue de 1955 à 1959 et Mr. A. J. Barter, Australie, élue de 1955 à 1957. Pour remplacer Mr. Sixten von Hofsten, démissionnaire pour raisons de santé, Mr. Torsten Fahlman, Suède fut élu comme Trésorier de la F. I. T. A. de 1955 à 1957. Le président souhaita la bienvenue aux nouveaux membres du Conseil et exprima sa profonde gratitude à l'égard de Mr. von Hofsten qui fut membre du Conseil dès la fondation de la Fédération.

After the call-over of names, the President heartily greeted the Delegates, specially those attending to a Congress Meeting for the first time: Mlle. Bernot, M. Koblisch, M. Filip and Mr. Bolle. He also heartily greeted the German Observer, Mr. Tinnefeld, expressing his hope to see Germany as a Member of FITA before long.

IX. Minutes of the FITA Congress of 1953

The Minutes of the FITA Congress of 1953, as published in the FITA Bulletin No. 14, were unanimously accepted.

X. Report of the President

The Report of the President, which had been separately distributed, was unanimously accepted.

XI. Financial Report for 1953—1955

The Treasurer's Financial Report for 1953—1955, which had been separately distributed, was unanimously accepted.

XII. Olympic Report

The General Secretary reported that FITA had been officially invited to send two Delegates to the IOC Meeting in Paris on June 12th—18th, 1955. The Executive Committee first appointed Mr. Kjellson and Mr. Ekegren to go, but later on Mr. Kjellson became seriously ill, because of which he was replaced by M. Kessels. The French and Belgian Archery Associations had arranged an archery demonstration for the Olympic Delegates at Polo de Bagatelle on June 12th. This demonstration was a success. In spite of rain about 35 Nations were present, and many new personal contacts had already given positive results. Strangely enough, the official FITA Delegates were not permitted to take part in the Meetings. However, they did their best to contact the Olympic Delegates and to give them all information wanted about archery. On July 17th the archery question came up, unfortunately together with some other sports, and our request was turned down by a majority of votes. Many archery countries didn't vote, or voted against archery. The General Secretary ended by pointing out that more Member Nations in close cooperation with their respective National Olympic Committees would mean more votes and success in the future. He also thanked the arrangers of the archery demonstration, specially mentioning M. Demare, M. Bédard and M. Kessels. Also Mr. Hiekamies, M. Massard, Mr. Ekelund and Mr. von Frenckell had been very helpful. The Report was unanimously accepted.

M. Kessels thanked the General Secretary and suggested that FITA should give a symbolic sum of money to the French Archery Association, to cover part of the expenses connected with the archery demonstration. This was unanimously accepted, and it was decided that the Executive Committee should see what could be done about the money.

XIII. Report of the Technical Commission

The Report of the Technical Commission of the XVII^e World Championship Tournament was read by its President, Mr. Mark Savonius (Finland). It was unanimously accepted.

XIV. The Annual Fee

Basing his opinion upon the Financial Report, Mr. Poulsen suggested an increase of the Annual Fee from 100 to 200 Swedish Crowns per Nation. This was accepted by all votes but two. Mr. Hunter proposed that 200 Sw. Cr. should include five free copies of every issue of the Bulletin. This suggestion was also accepted.

XV. Election of Members of the FITA Administrative Council

Mr. C. W. Nettleton, Great Britain, M. Jaroslav Lenecek, Czechoslovakia, and Mr. Oscar Kessels, Belgium, were unanimously re-elected Vice Presidents of FITA from 1955 to 1959. Mr. Robert Neerby, Norway, Mr. Roger Bédard, France, and Mr. E. J. Parker, South Africa, were re-elected Members of the Council for the same period. New Members of the Council were Mrs. Jean Richards, USA, elected from 1955 to 1959, and Mr. A. J. Barter, Australia, elected from 1955 to 1957. Instead of Mr. Sixten von Hofsten, who had resigned because of illness, Mr. Torsten Fahlman, Sweden, was elected Treasurer of FITA from 1955 to 1957. The President welcomed the new Members of the Council and expressed his deep gratitude to Mr. von Hofsten, who had been a Member of the Council since the very start of the Federation.

XVI. Viseurs, points de repère, voyants de contrôle à la traction

Après discussion du problème, le congrès prit la décision suivante:

Viseurs

Les simples viseurs (sauf ceux comportant une lentille ou un prisme) seront autorisés ainsi qu'une attache à la corde ne dépassant pas un centimètre dans n'importe quel sens (Proposition australienne).

Points de repère

Seront également autorisés.

Voyants de contrôle à la traction

Autorisés.

Les viseurs furent acceptés par 14 voix contre 4. Les points de repère par 17 voix contre 1 et les "voyants de contrôle" par 15 voix contre 3.

XVII. Prochains tournois de Championnat du Monde

La Belgique retira sa motion relative à des Championnats du Monde annuels. Le congrès décida que le prochain tournoi de Championnat du Monde serait organisé à Prague (Tchéco-Slovaquie) en 1957. Un championnat du Monde extra-ordinaire sera mis sur pied à Bruxelles en 1958, en corrélation avec l'Exposition Universelle. M. Kessels fut l'interprète de la Ville de Bruxelles, qui a promis de payer les frais d'inscription pour tous les participants de même que pour les équipes.

XVIII. Championnats régionaux

Le congrès décida que la FITA pourra autoriser l'organisation de Championnats Régionaux sans modification du règlement existant.

XIX. Assemblée du Conseil FITA à Stockholm

Le Congrès décida qu'une assemblée du Conseil FITA aura lieu à Stockholm le premier dimanche d'octobre 1956. Des motions et suggestions pour cette assemblée seront à adresser au Bureau de la FITA avant le 1er janvier 1956. L'assemblée de Stockholm sera autorisée à statuer dans les questions suivantes:

1. — Records du Monde et Records de Championnats du Monde.
2. — Titres de champions du Monde.
3. — Prix-Challenges des Championnats du Monde.
4. — Médailles des Championnats du Monde.
5. — Motion Tchéco-Slovaque concernant des juges internationaux.

XX. Modifications du règlement

Une motion anglaise de ré-éditer le Règlement FITA et de le diviser en deux chapitres: Règlement et Réglementation — fut approuvée.

XXI. Le programme du Championnat du Monde

Conformément à une décision du Congrès d'Oslo en 1953, un comité pour le programme — composé de Robert Neerbye (Président), Axel Poulsen et Antti Hiekkaies — avait procédé à une enquête parmi les Fédérations-membres et les membres du conseil administratif afin de trouver un moyen pour écourter la durée du tir aux tournois de championnat du Monde. Un rapport fut élaboré et distribué en avril 1955. Toutes les suggestions furent discutées suivant un tableau de vote, proposé par le Président. Selon ce tableau, le Congrès décida d'abord, par 16 voix contre 2, que des changements seraient apportés dans le Programme des Championnats du Monde. Ensuite il fut résolu par 14 voix contre 4 qu'une modification de base et non partielle devrait intervenir.

Le congrès prit les résolutions suivantes:

- 1° — Une nouvelle "série" dénommée "Série FITA" sera adoptée. Cette "série" remplacera les courtes et longues distances internationales aux tournois de Championnats du Monde et aux tournois olympiques.
- 2° — Un tournoi de Championnat du Monde ou un tournoi olympique comportera deux "Séries FITA". Il sera procédé à un vote par écrit parmi les fédérations affiliées et les membres du Conseil Administratif pour déterminer si ces deux "Séries" se tiendront en deux, trois ou quatre jours.
- 3° — Une simple "Série FITA" consistera en:

Messieurs 36 flèches à 90 mètres

36 " à 70 "

36 " à 50 "

36 " à 30 " = 144 flèches

Dames 36 flèches à 70 mètres

36 " à 60 "

36 " à 50 "

36 " à 30 " = 144 flèches

4° — Si le tir a lieu en un jour, les deux longues distances seront tirées avant le déjeuner et les deux courtes après.

5° — Aux distances de 90 et 70 m. (Messieurs) et de 70 et 60 m. (Dames) un blason international diamètre 122 cm., avec 10

XVI. Pinsights, points of aim, drawcheck indicators

After a discussion about the aiming problem, Congress decided as follows:

Pinsights:

Simple bowsights other than dioptric (i. e. those embodying a lens or prism) shall be allowed. An attachment on the string, not exceeding one centimetre in any direction, is also allowed. (Australian motion.)

Points of aim

Shall be allowed, as now.

Drawcheck indicators

Shall be allowed.

Pinsights were accepted by 14 votes to 4, Points of aim by 17 votes to 1, and Drawcheck indicators by 15 votes to 3.

XVII. Next World Championship Tournament

Belgium withdrew a Motion about World Championship Tournaments each year. Congress decided that the Next World Championship Tournament should then be arranged in Prague, Czechoslovakia, in 1957. An extra World Championship Tournament should then be arranged in Brussels in 1958, in connection with the Belgian World Fair. M. Kessels spoke for the City of Brussels, which promised to pay all entrance fees for individuals and teams.

XVIII. Regional Championships

Congress decided that FITA could permit Regional Championships to take place without any change of the present Rules.

XIX. FITA Council Meeting in Stockholm

Congress decided that a FITA Council Meeting should take place in Stockholm on the first Sunday of October, 1956. Motions and Proposals for this Meeting to be sent to the FITA Office before January 1st, 1956. The Stockholm Meeting was given the right to decide about the following questions:

1. World Records and World Championship Records.
2. World Championship Titles.
3. World Championship Challenge Prizes.
4. World Championship Medals.
5. A Czechoslovakian Motion about International Judges.

XX. Changes of the FITA RULES

An English suggestion—that the FITA Rules should be re-written and re-arranged into two parts: Rules and Regulations—was approved.

XXI. The World Championship Programme

In accordance with a decision of the Oslo Meeting in 1953 a Programme Committee—consisting of Robert Neerbye (Chairman), Axel Poulsen and Antti Hiekkaies—had made an investigation among the Member Associations and the Members of the Administrative Council, in order to find a way of shortening the shooting time of the World Championship Tournaments. A Report had been made and distributed in April 1955. All suggestions were discussed according to a voting plan, suggested by the President. According to this plan, Congress first decided, by 16 votes to 2, that alterations in the World Championship Programme should be made. Then it was decided by 14 votes to 4 that a basic—and not a minor—change should be made.

Congress decided as follows:

1. A new Round, named the "FITA Round", be recognized. This round will replace the International Long and Short Rounds at World Championship Tournaments and at Olympic Tournaments.
2. A World Championship Tournament or an Olympic Tournament will consist of two FITA Rounds. There will be a vote by letter amongst the Member Associations and the Members of the Administrative Council about these two Rounds in two, three or four days.
3. A single FITA Round will consist of
Gentlemen: 36 arrows at 90 metres
36 arrows at 70 metres
36 arrows at 50 metres
36 arrows at 30 metres = 144 arrows
- Ladies:* 36 arrows at 70 metres
36 arrows at 60 metres
36 arrows at 50 metres
36 arrows at 30 metres = 144 arrows
4. If shot on one day, the two longer distances are to be shot before lunch and the two shorter after.

cercles, sera utilisé. Aux distances de 50 et 30 M. (Dames et Messieurs) un blason international diamètre 80 cm., avec 10 cercles, sera utilisé.

6° — Pointage de 10 à 1. Roses et ors à valoriser comme dans les courtes distances internationales.

XXII. Concours FITA par correspondance

Le Congrès décida que des concours par correspondance seront organisés annuellement à partir de 1956. Ce concours comportera une simple "Série FITA" tiré en 1 jour lors d'une compétition officiellement reconnue par la Fédération Nationale et conformément au règlement sur les concours par correspondance. La décision intervint par 15 voix contre 3.

XXIII. Interprètes aux Congrès FITA

Le congrès résolut que des interprètes pour les langues française, allemande et anglaise assisteront aux futurs Congrès FITA.

XXIV. Compétiteurs non-officiels aux Tournois de Championnat du Monde.

Le Congrès déclina une motion belge concernant la participation de compétiteurs non officiels aux Tournois de Championnats du Monde.

XXV. Concours pour l'emblème et le marqueur FITA

Le Comité pour l'Emblème, composé de Lars Ekegren, (Président) Jean Richards et Roger Béday, rapporta que Mr. Ingvar Helje, Malung, Suède, a gagné le concours pour l'emblème. Ce rapport fut approuvé à l'unanimité.

Le Congrès décida de supprimer le concours pour le marqueur, aucune des suggestions adressées au Bureau de la FITA étant reconnue suffisante.

XXVI. Questions diverses

Des questions diverses ne furent inscrites à l'ordre du jour. Mrs. Frith exprima la reconnaissance des fédérations affiliées à l'égard du Secrétaire-Général et la Finlande remercia spécialement le Président pour sa coopération bienveillante. Le Président clôutra l'assemblée en remerciant tous les délégués pour la façon positive et loyale dont les problèmes difficiles furent discutés et pour avoir contribué à la réussite de cette assemblée historique.

La séance fut levée à 12 H. 15.

APPENDIX 1

Report of the President

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Since the affiliation of Switzerland in 1953, our Federation now consists of 18 Nations representing 4 Continents. Europe leads by 13 Nations, but the other Continents are expected to increase their number of Nations within a few years. Archery is growing very fast in these days, all around the world.

India, Italy and Venezuela have officially asked for affiliation, and the following Nations have shown their interest in joining us later on: Canada, Germany, Luxembourg, People's Republic of China, the Philippines, and Turkey.

The XVIth World Championship Tournament took place in Oslo on July 20th—25th, 1953. The total number of competitors was 61, representing the following Nations:

Nine Nations were not represented, because of various reasons.

Jean Richards, USA, won the Ladies' competition, scoring 3056 p., followed by Ilta-Meri Santaosa, Finland, scoring 2804 p., and Mme Lang, France, scoring 2688 p.

The Gentlemen's competition was won by Bror Lundgren, Sweden, scoring 3205 p., followed by Einar Tang-Holbek, Denmark, and Carl-Erik Bissman, Sweden, both scoring 3089 p.

The team competitions were won by Finland (Ladies), 7681 p., and Sweden (Gentlemen) 9355 p.

5. At 90 m and 70 m (Gentlemen), and at 70 m and 60 m (Ladies) a 10-ringed, International target face will be used. Diameter: 122 cm.

At 50 m and 30 m (Ladies and Gentlemen) a 10-ringed, International target face will be used. Diameter: 80 cm.

6. All scoring from 10 to 1 points. Hits and golds to be considered as in the International Short Round.

XXII. The FITA Mail-Match

Congress decided that FITA Mail-Matches should be arranged every year from 1956 on. This Match should consist of a single FITA Round, shot in one day in a competition recognized by the National Archery Association, and according to the Mail-Match Rules. The decision was made by 15 votes to 3.

XXIII. Interpreters at FITA Congresses

Congress decided that interpreters for French, English and German should be present at all future FITA Congresses.

XXIV. Unofficial competitors at World Championship Tournaments

Congress did not accept a Belgian Motion about letting unofficial competitors take part in World Championship Tournaments.

XXV. The Emblem and Marking Stand Competitions

The FITA Emblem Committee, consisting of Lars Ekegren (Chairman), Jean Richards and Roger Béday, reported that Mr. Ingvar Helje, Malung, Sweden, had won the Emblem competition. The Report was unanimously accepted.

Congress decided to drop the Marking Stand competition, as no good suggestions had been sent in to the FITA office.

XXVI. Sundry Questions

There were no sundry questions to discuss. Mrs. Frith expressed the Member Nations' gratitude to the General Secretary, and Finland specially thanked the President for his kind cooperation. The President ended the Meeting by thanking all Delegates for positive and loyal discussions of difficult problems, and for a historic Meeting.

The Meeting ended at 12.15 p. m.

Eight official World Records were beaten: 50 m (Long) Jean Richards, USA, 519 p. 90 m Bror Lundgren, Sweden, 750 p. 70 m Bror Lundgren, Sweden, 644 p. 50 m (Long) Bror Lundgren, Sweden, 382 p. Long Distances, total, Bror Lundgren, Sweden, 1776 p. Grand Total Bror Lundgren, Sweden, 3205 p. Teams: Long Distances, Gentlemen: Sweden, 5124 p. Grand Total, Gentlemen: Sweden, 9355 p.

The competitions took place at the Bislet Stadium, and the arrangements were perfect. Crown Prince Olav and Prince Harald were both present at the opening ceremony. Our Norwegian hosts were most generous, and the final banquet at the world-famous Holmenkollen will never be forgotten.

The second and third FITA Mail-Matches have been arranged in 1953 and 1954, respectively. Winners were:

About 60 Ladies and 80 Gentlemen took part in the competition, as well in 1953 as in 1954.

Since the FITA Congress in 1953 our Olympic activities have been strongly increased. We have been constantly corresponding with the IOC authorities and with the National Olympic Committees all around the world. All of them have received our Statutes and Shooting Rules as well as No. 13 and No. 14 of our official Bulletin.

We have also sent them a questionnaire and have received answers from 31 countries, out of which only four are not prepared to vote for archery at the IOC Session in Paris this year.

At this Session, which will take place in June, archery will be demonstrated to the Olympic delegates at a competition, arranged by

the French and Belgian Archery Associations. M. Paul Demare, our Honorary President, will lead this demonstration, assisted by M. Roger Bédard and M. Oscar Kessels.

Our Delegates at the IOC Session will be M. Oscar Kessels and Mr. Lars Ekegren.

The Minutes of the FITA Congress in Oslo in 1953 have been printed in our "Bulletin Officiel" No. 14 (1954).

Many important questions will be discussed at the FITA Congress in Helsinki this year. I therefore hope that a majority of our Member Nations will be able to send their Delegates there, well prepared to take a vote after careful discussions about the Proposals and Motions at home.

There are changes suggested about the World Championships, prizes, titles, shooting rules and records. Continental Championships will also be discussed, among other important things.

Members of the Administrative Council will be elected for a period of four years, and our first Plaquettes for International Merits will be decided about.

This gives me an opportunity of mentioning our activities around the FITA Emblem, completed during 1954. FITA pins and car badges have been made and sold according to the Treasurer's Report, and a special pin and car badge has been made for Members and former Members of the Administrative Council.

APPENDIX 2

Report by the Technical Commission of the XVIIth World Championship Tournament

V. Köblich, Czechoslovakia, O. Lifors, Sweden, and M. Savonius, Finland, were elected members of the Technical Committee by the Captains of the teams taking part in the Tournament. The Committee then elected M. Savonius President.

The shooting distances have been controlled, likewise all the targets used. The height of the centres of the targets has been checked. The availability of first-rate 122 cms targets being limited, the Technical Committee decided that one Long Round and the next day's 50 m Short Round should be shot at the same targets.

When inspected, the equipment of the Archers was found to be in accordance with the Rules, with the exception of a couple of cases when slight adjustments were to be made.

We have also made the 1955 World Championship Medals, ordered by the Finnish Archery Association.

The Plaquettes for International Merits are gilt, and in silver and bronze.

Finally I have to report, with deep regret, the passing to the Eternal Rest of our Honorary President, Dr. Bronislaw Pierzchala, Poland, and our "great little lady", Mrs. Louise Nettleton, England, both of them legendary promoters of international archery.

I also deeply regret the resignation of Major Sixten von Hofsten, our Treasurer, who has been a Member of the Administrative Council—in different functions—since the very start of our Federation. He is now ill, and Mr. Torsten Fahlman has taken over his office, according to a vote by letter. This vote has to be confirmed by Congress.

Mr Fahlman is wellknown to all old archery friends, and he is very welcome as a Member of the Council.

I wish you all welcome to Helsinki and to the Congress Meeting. Our Finnish friends have a world-wide reputation as perfect arrangers. We can therefore look forward to another first-class World Championship Tournament.


Lady Champion of the World

The World Championship Tournament in Helsinki last year was marvellous in all respects, except for the weather. The chilly storm did its best to kill all top scores, and experts with a weak bow like Ron Hunter, South Africa, could never reach their normal standard.

Still some World Records were beaten. The British Lady Team was absolutely outstanding. They didn't stop until all Team Records were beaten. If we aren't quite mistaken, Mrs. Frith looked rather satisfied.

The Grand Champions of the World were both newcomers to the World Championship Tournaments. Wisniowska is a very nice young lady teacher from Poland, and Andersson is known from

The Helsinki Tournament in 1955





many sports in Sweden. Among other things, he is a first class wrestler!

The arrangements were absolutely unique, thanks to General Tapola and his numerous staff from the Finnish Archery Association. Messrs. Hiekkamies, Lihte and Saxberg, who formed the Executive Committee of the Tournament, had been drilling their assistants for more than one year, and the result was a perfect organisation. Everybody knew what to do—everything looked simple like that!

Accumulating scores came up on the board and were announced within a couple of minutes, and complete stencils were distributed



to the archers and the press within half an hour after the end of each distance. How was it done?

We have asked the Organizers to answer that question, to the benefit of coming international tournaments. This is their report:

Appointed by the Finnish Archery Association a Planning Committee of three persons with General K. A. Tapola as Chairman drew up a plan for organizing the program of the Tournament.

According to that plan an Organizing Committee of nine persons was appointed, and amongst these members the various tasks of the committee were distributed.


To facilitate the work of the Organizing Committee an Executive Committee of three was appointed to be responsible for organizing the entire tournament program as well as the technical arrangements. The diagram shows how the plan of organisation was built up. Like bricks in a wall the various tasks, when they showed up, were fitted into the organisation plan until all conceivable "bricks" were put into their right sections. The heads of the sections were responsible that the tasks entrusted to them were carried into execution.

Moreover the Executive Committee appointed the Director of Shooting, the Commissioner of the Congress and the Finnish Member of the Technical Commission.

A perfect and fast working tournament machinery is the first condition for carrying through, in an irreproachable way, a contest of the extensiveness of the World Championship Tournament.

It is of importance for the preparations to have knowledge in advance of the approximate number of participants. On the base of experiences from previous World Championship Tournaments and by obtaining preliminary information from the members of FITA, the Organizing Committee was able to estimate the number of participants at a maximum of 120. By planning three archers for every target, the Committee could take measures for procuring a suitable Tournament Ground and necessary officials.

During the course of the Tournament, the organization machinery worked as follows, exactly according to the plans made up beforehand:



- 1) At each target was stationed a scorer who thus recorded the scores of three archers. Every archer had his own sheet of scores, which were written in three copies.
- 2) The targets were divided into groups of five, and for each group was assigned a controller whose task was to carefully check the summing up of the sheet of scores. This control was made after each series of three arrows, and thus the numerical results were automatically checked as the various distances were finished. Of course, the persons assigned to this post were put to a severe test.
- 3) The announcements during the Tournament were divided into three sections:
 - a) *Public information*, by which, after each series of three arrows, the accumulated scores of the five best ladies and the ten best gentlemen were announced on a notice-board situated opposite the public stand, and further by means of loudspeakers. These results were announced as *unverified*.
 - b) *Press information*, which after every finished distance by means of duplicated lists recorded all achieved scores in consecutive order, and also the scores so far achieved by each archer in the whole Tournament, likewise in consecutive order. These lists were distributed also to team-captains and to archers. Also these results were published as *unverified*.

- c) *Official announcements* on the big notice-board of the tournamentground, whereby after each distance the scores so far achieved by each archer were published in consecutive order. These scores were published as *verified*. After the conclusion of the Tournament, a Summary of scores was drawn up and distributed in connexion with the distribution of prizes.

The organization plan enclosed to this article gives a description of the functions of the machinery. According to this plan, the scorer keeps in direct touch with his controller. In order to secure a fast announcement of the scores, the Public information is placed between the target and the control. The scorer counts, besides the results achieved on the Distance in progress, also the scores so far achieved by the archer after each series of three arrows. He communicates this to the Public information, which by telephone forwards the five best Ladies' scores and the ten best Gentlemen's scores to the respective notice-board and to the speaker. Practically, it is not necessary to count the accumulated scores of all the archers, but only of the best ones. As soon as an archer has passed a competitor whose score is visible on the notice-board, the scorer reacts and reports to the Public information.

When the last arrow of the distance in question has been shot, the scorer rapidly adds up the total score, gets the signature of the archer and gives

- 1) one copy of the sheet of scores to the archer,
- 2) one copy to the Press information, and
- 3) the original to his controller.

Thus, the Press information and the controller are able to simultaneously continue their subsequent work.

By calculating machine the controller checks the minutes further, whereupon he enters the final scores achieved on the distance into

- 1) the *big shooting card*, which shows score, number of hits and number of golds on each separate distance, as well as the total so far achieved during the Tournament. Thereafter the controller assorts these cards in consecutive order, considering the total so far achieved, and sends his 15 cards to the Tournament Office.
- 2) the *distance card*, which comprises a double distance. If the shooting just concluded was the first on this distance, the controller keeps the card, but if the scores applied to the second shooting on the distance, the scores will be added up, the cards assorted in consecutive order and sent to the Tournament Office.
- 3) The total scores so far achieved are entered into a *Summary* (collecting card for the official notice-board) and promptly sent to the official notice-board for publication.

When the Tournament Office has received the different cards from all the controllers, all the cards are assorted in consecutive order, whereupon the official score lists can be drawn up. Since the scores on the different distances are added up by the following different stages, it is evident that the results agree if they tally at all these stages:

- 1) by the scorer, who transfers the sum to be carried forward from the previous sheet of scores to the sheet of the new distance,
- 2) by the controller, who records the score on the big shooting card and in the collecting card for the official notice-board, and

3) by the Office clerk, who is in charge of the adding up of the scores on the various double distances and Long Rounds and Short Rounds.

Although it may seem that such manifold writing is time-consuming and unreliable, it was observed during the course of Tournament that the very handy card-system, in combination with trained officials, well counterbalanced the extensive writing.

To the Tournament organization belonged the following forms and cards:

1) *Sheet of scores of the Tournament*, with columns for scores, hits, golds, and sums carried forward from preceding and to next distance. The results in the different columns were accumulated, and the total of sheet thus showed

- total score
- total hits
- total golds
- Grand Total

All the sheet were prepared in typewriting in order to avoid errors in the spelling of names et cetera. Naturally it was up to the scorer to choose the proper sheet for each distance. The last sheet of the Grand Champion of the World:

2) the *big shooting card*, with vertical columns for the different Tournament days, in which columns were recorded score, number of hits and golds, and the position. Long and Short Rounds were recorded horizontally, and the total was added up partly as the accumulated results on the different distances, partly by summing together Long and Short Rounds. E.g. the Lady World Champion's big shooting card:

The Scores of the World Championship Tournaments


How good is good in World Championship Tournaments? What can we expect in coming Tournaments?


The scores from the first years, when the International Round wasn't shot, have been transferred to equivalent figures of the International Round.

Gentlemen, Short Distances



It was the first time for a lady to beat Kurkowska's fine shooting of 1931 (!) at the 50 m Long Distance. And the first time for a lady to shoot as fine as the best men, in the Short Distances.


A six-ringed target was used at 35 m and 25 m until 1937 and 1947, respectively. We then got our ten-ringed targets of 80 and 60 centimetres. Also in this case, the scores have been transferred from the old targets to the new ones.
