#### **EUROPEAN CQT: IMPORTANT**

e inform you that FITA Council has reviewed the procedure for the Qualification at the European Championships in terms of the Olympic Places and made a decision on how to break possible ties.

The places will be awarded to the first 3 not yet qualified archers / countries based on the final ranking.

In case of a tied ranking that determines one of the 3 places or the first 8 stand-by places, the standard shoot-off procedure will be used as for going to the next phase of the competition. This means a single arrow shoot-off for score (with a maximum of three shoot-off's). This applies only to eligible archers and in case a shoot-off is necessary. See article 7.6.21 for the procedure on the final ranking of the elimination round.

Some examples have been included to explain the system. These are based on the results of the Grand Prix of Welzheim and are a simulation only to explain the system.

In this case there is no need for a shoot off between the first two since both qualify for the Olympic Games.

In case of France the place is obtained by Agnes, Bablee and not by Alexandra Fouace since she already obtained a place for France at the World Championships.

The time of the shoot-off will be announced at the team captains meeting in Antalya and further details will be explained during this meeting.

#### RULE INTREPRETATIONS

#### Judge Committee1

Procedure for enforcing rule 7.8.3.1 (and 7.8.3.3). Rules:

Art 7.8.3.1 If a member of a team crosses the 1-meter line too soon the judge will raise the yellow card or will switch on a yellow light in front of the shooting line to indicate that the competitor will have to return behind the 1-meter line to start over again or be replaced by another competitor with arrows to shoot.

Art 7.8.3.3 The same procedure applies if a team member removes an arrow from the quiver before standing on the shooting line.

#### Procedure:

A) Standard procedure. One judge for two teams. The line judge will stand half a meter back from the one-meter line between the two teams. If a violation occurs, the judge will step to the one-meter line, say the team name facing the team, raise the yellow card and switch on a yellow light (possibly flashing) in front of the shooting line. If the yellow light is not available, the judge will wave the yellow card back and forth (to get the coaches' and competitors' attention).

B) Procedure for Olympics. One judge per team. The line judges will stand on the one-meter line near the coach box. If a violation occurs, the judge will step to the shooting line, say the team name, raise the yellow card and switch on a yellow light (possibly flashing) in front of the shooting line. If the yellow light is not available, the judge will wave the yellow card back and forth (to get the coaches' and competitors' attention).

Procedure B should be limited to Olympics (and/or World Championship) with Line Judges well trained to act with consistency. The ordinary procedure to be followed is procedure A.

In all cases, the same procedure (A or B) should be followed throughout all the stages of the team competition. This limits the possibility of misunderstanding (team officials and competitors expect a consistent behavior of judges).

The actual procedure should be clearly detailed and distributed in writing in occasion of a team captains' meeting. The team managers should be aware that for the left side team (when there are two judges per match), the judge is behind a right handed archer, so the archer (and possibly the coach) cannot see the judge. A similar situation occurs for the right side team when there is one judge per match. Different situations occurs when left-handed archers are going to shoot. Therefore is vital the team managers (and competitors) are conscious of the procedure actually adopted by the judges and that this procedure is consistency followed.

The (flashing) yellow light should be, possibly, near thes hooting line (and not in the clock).

<u>Example</u>. A team shoot its arrows within the time limit according to entry 12 (6+4+0 arrows) with the following actual value of the single arrows:

10, 10, 10, 10, 9, 9, 9, 8, 8, 8

Column "Score", row 12, reads 6 lowest; therefore that end should be scored:

9, 9, 9, 8, 8, 8, M, M, M

The above reported table is consistent with:

- 1. If an archer shoot less than 3 arrows he cannot get any score for the unshot arrow. This is not a penalty: an unshot arrow cannot give any point! (see for example entry 5).
- 2. More than 3 arrows per archer or 9 arrows per team: score the lowest 9 arrows and in any case not more than 3 arrows per archer (e.g.: $\underline{4}+3+3$ : 3+3+3=9, the 9 lowest values of the team;  $\underline{4}+3+2$ : 3+3+2=8, the 8 lowest values of the team;...). In this context we must  $\underline{NOT}$  consider the unshot arrows.
- 3. If one arrow is shot out of time, this arrow has to be considered as part of that end and the higher value (of the team), as determined above, will be forfeited.

**In conclusion**: the only infractions in the tables reported above is shooting too many arrows (more than 3 per archer) or shooting out of time.

#### **Technical Committee**

Referring to the Interpretation on the arrow rest in FITA Information 6, this was referring to arrow rests for the Bare-bow division.

#### **Request from DTAC to Member Associations**

We ask all of the Member Associations that produce a translation of the FITA Rule Book into a language different from French and English to send a copy to the FITA office. We also remind our member associations that they have to request the permission of FITA for each

edition to translate the book into another language, which FITA will give to the Member Associations concerned. Furthermore a clause should be included in the translated version that the only two official versions are the French and English version.

#### **Important Medical Information**

There has been an important amendment for the Anti-Doping Code which also applies to FITA. Article2 now reads: All athletes are subject to doping controls (urine analyses, **blood tests and other authorized techniques** for detecting prohibited substances or methods).
