IMPORTANT!

FITA really wants to attract the attention of its Member Associations to the importance of answering the surveys they receive from us. As you know, 2004 is a crucial year for Archery with the IOC deciding which sports are going to stay in the Olympics and which are not. This is why we really need you to reply to our request for information. Please see the **alarming** statistics below:

1. Anti Doping Survey (regarding doping test in and out of competition for 2002 & 2003 and the adverse analytical findings) – 25/132 (**19%**) MAs replied.
2. Training Centre Survey (regarding archery training centre around the world, professional coaches, facilities at the centre, language use) – 27/132 (**20%**) MAs replied.
3. School Project Survey (regarding problem occur in having school tournament in school and problems face by MAs to organize archery in school) – 31/132 (**23%**) MAs replied.

C&R COMMITTEE

ERRATA

The following omissions (underlined) have to be added to the published 2004 C&R Book edition:

- 7.1.1.1 50/40/30 meters
- 7.3.3.1.3 Risers including a brace are permitted provided the brace does not touch the athlete's
8.3.2.1.3 hand or wrist
- 9.3.1.3.3
- 7.4.6.1 In the Olympic Round Team event the three (or four) athletes in the team ...
- 8.1.1.4 Add as last line:
A tolerance of measurement shall not exceed ± 2 cm.

RULE INTERPRETATIONS

(refers to C&R Book 1, 1.16.7 to 1.16.10)

Book 4, Art. 9.3.2.3 (1 March 2004)

A technical question was raised referring to Book 4, Art.9.3.2.3, regarding the serving on the string of a barebow, which says in this article "... must not in any way assist aiming through the use of a peephole, **marking** or any other means." There is, however, serving material on the market with white spots, which by twisting it when putting it on the string, might give a relative symmetrical pattern. Such material was mentioned e.g. as BCY #62.

Technical Committee response:

(checked by the C&R Committee as being not contrary to existing rules or Congress decisions)

It is the majority opinion of the FITA Technical Committee that the serving in question is legal for the Bare Bow division of FITA. We cannot see where this type of serving presents any advantage to archers in this division in the ability to determine distance marks or provide any aid in aiming.

Book 3, Art. 8.5.2.2, 4th bullet (19 March 2004)

The question was raised whether the bylaw change adopted by Council on December 8th 2003 concerning the coin toss, article 7.5.2.2 also applied to indoor tournaments.

The C&R Committee after consulting the submitter of the motion is unanimous that the bylaw change applies to indoor tournaments, too, as appropriate.

Therefore Book 3, Art. 8.5.2.2, 4th bullet, should be read as:

- *In single match play **alternating shooting**, the highest placed athlete in the ranking round will decide the order of shooting of the first end. The athlete with the lowest cumulative score will shoot first the next end. If the athletes are tied, the athlete that shot first in the first end, shoots first in the next end.*

Book 1, Art. 1.12.5 (23 March 2004)

The question has been raised concerning Book 1, Art. 1.12.5, which reads: "Council decisions will be made by a simple majority of votes expressed". How can a tie be broken when a decision results in a tie?

C&R Committee response: The C&R Committee is unanimous that in such cases it is normal democratic procedure to give the chairperson of a decision-making body a casting vote.

Book 1, Appendix 1, Art. 6.6.2.2 (23 March 2004)

The question has been raised concerning Book 1, Appendix 1, Art. 6.6.2.2, which reads: "The Secretary General will publish the approved new Bylaw with its effective start date within 30 days of the Council's decision". Who will decide on the effective start date?

C&R Committee response: It is the unanimous opinion of the C&R Committee that Council as the decision-making body should also decide on the effective start date and that the date should be between 3-6 months after the decision.

BYLAW DECISION

Member Associations may need to refer to the published ByLaw Changes previously submitted and distributed and also to the FITA Constitution and Rule Book for a full understanding of the implications of these ByLaw change.

The FITA Secretary General, Giuseppe Cinnirella indicates that this bylaw has been passed through proper procedure, been revised by the relevant Committee, and finally revised by the Constitution and Rules Committee.

Book 1, Chapter 3, Art. 3.9.1.1, 1st bullet (24 March 2004)

Effective start date: with immediate effect

- 3.9.1.1 *These documents will be distributed before and after the competition:*
- *A program for the Championship indicating dates, times and localities of all competitions, ceremonies, occasions and services of interest to athletes and officials: this program must have been approved by the Coordination Committee (Article 3.5.1).*

IMPORTANT COUNCIL VOTE

As a consequence of the C&R Interpretation concerning Book 1, Appendix 1, Art. 6.6.2.2 (see above), the intention of the Dress Regulations bylaws (Book 1, Art. 3.22.1.1 to 3.22.1.5) was reviewed and Council Members have been requested to vote on the following:

The bylaws Book 1, 3.22.1.1 to 3.22.1.5 inclusive, passed in December 2003 Council meeting, will be effective for the Athens Olympic Games only and will be subject to further discussion and voting by Council for other events.

This proposal has obtained a majority of the votes requested on 29th March 2004, and is therefore adopted. For other events than Olympic Games the rules in force prior to the December 2003 bylaws shall be applied.

Anti-Doping

IMPORTANT

New FITA Anti-Doping Rules comes into effect as of 1st April! All Members Associations are invited to read them carefully and adapt their own rules. Your contacts in FITA for all anti-doping matters: Françoise Dagouret (fdagouret@archery.org) and Chantal Steiner (csteiner@archery.org).

ATHLETES WHEREABOUTS

One of the first consequences of the new rules is the implementation of the FITA Registered Testing Pool, which includes international archers who are required to provide up-to-date whereabouts information to FITA. In 2004 it includes every archer who has obtained a quota place at the Olympic Games for his country, regardless whether independently if he or she will be participating in the Olympic Games. The full list of athletes will be published on the FITA website soon, and the Member Associations concerned will receive the first set of whereabouts forms for the period May/June 2004 in the next week. They include:

- Athletes location form
- Athletes change location form
- Athlete agreement
- Athlete Therapeutic Use Exemption (TUE) application form, should the case occurs
- National Teams training camps/competition plans

The latter does not only refer to athletes within the Registered Testing Pool, and all Member Associations.

FITA Office should receive requested whereabouts information no later than **15 April 2004**.

THERAPEUTIC USE EXEMPTIONS

Also as of 1 April, 2004, all archers wishing to compete internationally and subject to a Therapeutic Use Exemption must use the forms requested by the new anti-doping rules
It includes:

- the TUE Standard Application Form
- the TUE Abbreviated Process Form: This one can only be used for applications regarding medical treatment for beta 2 agonists and glucocorticosteroids by non-systemic route (e.g. eye/ear drops, nasal spray, cream)

These forms can be obtained from the FITA Office and downloaded from the FITA website under the link "Anti-Doping".

WADA INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION ANTI-DOPING SYMPOSIUM

Upon WADA initiative, an Anti-doping Symposium addressed to IFs was held in the Olympic Museum in Lausanne, on 17th and 18th March. The aim was to discuss the practical implementation of the World Anti-Doping Code. Françoise Dagouret and Chantal Steiner represented FITA, which was invited to present its anti-doping programme and situation with regards to the implementation of the Code.

This symposium was a great opportunity to share practical experience with other IFs, and FITA wants address its grateful thanks to WADA for this initiative. This was also the opportunity to meet with WADA Testing Program Manager in order to finalize plans and cooperation between WADA and FITA on the Out-of-Competition Testing Programme.

ANTI-DOPING ADMINISTRATOR

Upon recommendation of the FITA Medical Committee and the Executive Director, FITA Executive Committee has appointed Françoise Dagouret as the FITA Anti-Doping Administrator as defined in the new anti-doping rules. In the new anti-doping framework, the Anti-Doping Administrator has a key role in TUE and tests results management, and liaison with all FITA Committees involved in anti-doping (Medical, TUE, disciplinary panel, Executive and Council).

WEBSITE

Due to increasing need for communications on anti-doping matters, a specific Anti-Doping section has been created on the FITA website, which can be downloaded from the home page. It will be progressively filled up with information, news, rules, cases, international standards, Registered Testing Pool news, forms, etc...

LAST MINUTE!

Update on the 2004 List of prohibited Substances and Methods

WADA has issued a modified version of the 2004 List of prohibited substances and methods, which came into effect as of 26th March 2004. The changes do not affect the substances currently on the List. However, in order to be able to cover new "designer steroids" (such as THG) in the future, it seems important to WADA that substances that have a similar chemical structure or similar pharmacological effects be prohibited.

In consequence, the references to „analogues“ and „mimetics“ in section S4 and S% have been deleted and replaced by the same wording that is used in section S1 and S8. In addition the FIFA informed WADA that it does not wish to prohibit alcohol or beta-blockers in football, therefore references to FIFA under section P1 and P2 have been removed.

Judges

JUDGES CONFERENCE

Lilleshall (GBR), 27-29 February 2004

The International Judges Conference in Lilleshall was a success: 53 FITA judges and several guests met at the Lilleshall National Sports Center to hold our International Conference for 2004. Indeed, so many judges attended this conference that all accommodation facilities were saturated and not sit-ins could be accepted as in the past. The Grand National Archery Society, and especially Peter Morris, did an excellent job in putting this conference together in cooperation with the FITA Judges Committee and the FITA Office in Lausanne.

The Judges were honoured by the presence of Mrs. Lynne Evans, FITA Vice President, who opened the Conference on behalf of the FITA Council, as well as Mr. Terry Reilly, FITA Executive Director. Lynne was present during almost all the sessions, and contributed to the discussions with her expertise as an archer and sports administrator. Terry made an interesting presentation on Ski Archery, in correspondence with the snowfall that welcomed all the participants in the conference.

The judges dedicated a couple of hours discussing the answers to the re-accreditation test administered in 2003. On behalf of the Judges Committee Sergio Font explained the procedure followed by the Committee to prepare and mark the tests. Also, thirteen case studies were presented to the participants who discussed them in small groups.

Ann Web, chairwoman of IPC Archery, made a wonderful presentation on the basics of Archery for disabled people. Ann was the Technical Delegate for the World IPC Championships in Madrid last year and has a long history in this kind of events. Six of the nine judges who will officiate at the Paralympics in Athens attended the conference, and they certainly took advantage of Ann's lecture for their job next summer.

Another topic mentioned was Field Archery. The judges were divided into two groups on the basis of their knowledge of it. Per Bolstad (Field Archery Committee Chairman) made a highly motivating and interesting presentation to those who had already been exposed to Field Archery. Derrick Lovell introduced the judges with no previous exposure into the basics of this fascinating discipline.

HONORARY JUDGE

In March 2004 the FITA Judges Committee has decided to award Mr. Hubert KRAEMER (France) the Honorary Judge title.

Women & Sport

IOC CONFERENCE, 7-9 MARCH 2004

FITA was represented at the 3rd IOC Conference on Women & Sport held in Marrakech, Morocco, from 7 to 9 March 2004 by Mrs. Lynne Evans, Council Member. The conference attracted 600 delegates representing 137 different countries of which about 25% were men. The majority of delegates were from women and sport commissions (NOCs or Non Governmental Organisations), and 11 International Federations were represented. Lynne Evans addressed the conference in respect of the Loughborough Report on Women Leadership & the Olympic Movement, as well as in respect of FITA's performance in meeting the targets set by IOC.

The keynote speech by Jacques Rogge, IOC President, included reference to the fact that the IOC itself is below the threshold of the minimum targets of women in senior decision making roles (12 women out of 126 IOC Members). In comparison 8 International Federations (including FITA) are in compliance with the targets set.

During the conference Lynne Evans got into contact with the Secretary General of the Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF) and the Joint Secretary General of the NOC of Indian who were both very positive regarding the future of Archery on the Commonwealth Games programme in 2010 and 2014. The CGF kindly accepted the invitation for their General Assembly delegates to attend the Archery event in the Panathinaiko Stadium in Athens.

The next IOC Conference on Women & Sport will be held in 2008 (bids to host it already received). The International Women & Sport Organisation will next host its Conference in Japan in 2006.

Major Events

WORLD 3D CHAMPIONSHIPS

The World 3D Championship will be held in Genoa, Italy, on 10-20 May 2005 and it will be organized by the local Club AGA, affiliated to the Italian Archery Federation.

WORLD GAMES 2005

The 7th World Games will be held in Duisburg (Germany) from 14 to 17 July 2005. Archery will be on the program with a Field Event from 14 to 17 July (arrival 13th - departure 18th. Competitors from outside Europe may arrive one day earlier provided the Duisburg OC is notified early enough to arrange for hotel-accommodation). 96 archers will take part in this archery event. There will be women and men in the Barebow, Recurve and Compound divisions.

The quota places will be granted according to the final results of the 2004 FITA World Field Archery Championship to be held in Plitvice (CRO) from 5 to 10 July 2004. You can get more information on this Championship from the following Website: <http://www.archery.hr/wc2004/index.php>.

Nations are qualified in accordance with the result list and with a maximum of 2 archers in each class and division. The organizing country will have one free spot in each class and division, however, maximum two spots. In addition FITA and IWGA may allow 1 free spot in each class and division for invited nations – all within the allowed quota of 96 archers.

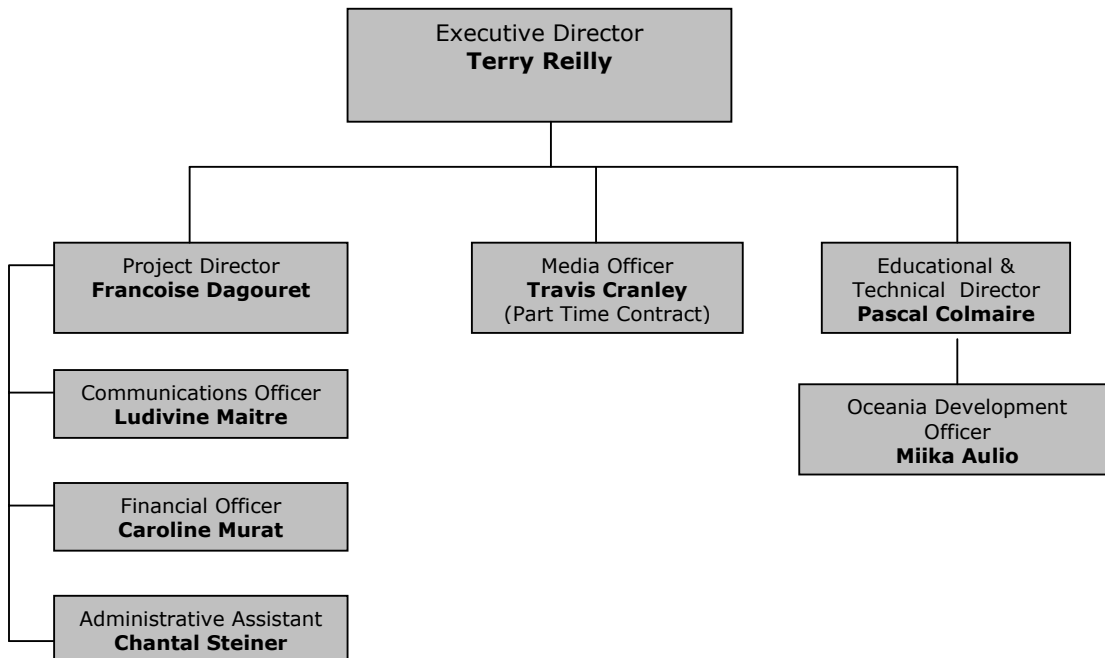
